UNKNOWN DANGERS One of these nights down at the local park, some unsuspecting player is going to suffer serious injury unless something is done to right the danger. The wire fence that skirts the outfield should be painted white to warn players of the hazard. An outfielder running at top speed might easily break a leg or neck if he came in contact with the wire. The other danger is home plate. The five cornered piece of wood sits about three inches above the ground and is especially dangerous to runners who attempt to slide in safely.
