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Spray School On June 15th
 The use of 2,4-D for weed control has revolutionized this all important phase of Agriculture. Accordingly, a Weed Spray School will be held at the Department of Agriculture, Newmarket, on June 15th, commencing at 10 a.m., and under the direction of Mr. Frank Marritt, County Weed Inspector for York. A short time ago, a weed spray school was held for municipal road authorities and roadside weed sprayer operators dealing with their specific problems in roadside weed control. The school to be held on June 15th is for all weed sprayer operators or anyone interested in chemical weed control.
 While 2,4-D is the prevalent chemical used in weed control, there are a great number of types and brands of the product which may be used for different conditions and specific weed problems. Of equal importance are the methods of application and the proper use of the sprayers. Also, there are materials other than 2,4-D which may be superior for the control of different plant species. 2,4,5-T and its mixture with 2,4-D to form the material called Brushkill which is superior on many woody plants, is one of the newer types of weed spray.
 Copies of the manual and guide for the use of the various chemicals are available at the office of the Agricultural Representative in Newmarket.
