

# Water and Sewers for Markham Township

Considerable work has been done by Reeve Alfred LeMasurier and Councillors Vern Griffin and Don Deacon, who comprise the water committee for Markham Township. The committee has surveyed an area in the south-west corner of the township where water supply and sanitary services are most critical, and engineers have prepared facts and figures for use by council.

Total cost of the water system has been estimated at \$750,000, and the sewers at \$570,000. Immediate installation of the entire scheme would involve an increase in the individual ratepayer of 44 cents, according to Councillor Deacon, who said that the entire project could not be borne at this time by the taxpayers.

Since only part of the scheme is planned for immediate action, numerous meetings have been necessary to determine where to start on the mammoth project. Reeve LeMasurier has pointed out that the most critical area is in the Doncaster and Highland Park areas, and the committee has based its calculations on this area as the starting point. At the same time several near-by sub-divisions will be provided with these services, the initial financing of the scheme depending upon the contributions of the sub-dividers.

At a special meeting in Thornhill school a week ago, the water committee met with representatives of Doncaster and Highland Park to explain plans and seek opinions of the rate-payers. Many questions were not settled to the satisfaction of the group, and as a result a delegation attended at the regular meeting of Township Council at Burtonville on Monday night, seeking further information.

As council had not been informed of the delegation, many questions of financing could not be answered, and arrangements were made to hold another meeting with the group on Wednesday night at Thornhill. At this meeting, Councillor Deacon said the group would be able to check surveys and estimates, and he felt that the committee's plan of action would be justified when the matter was further discussed at that time. Council adjourned on the motion that action on water and sewers be deferred until after the meeting, when policy on this question would be decided.
