THE OLD SWIMMING HOLE

Swimming is a fine sport. During the weekend thousands of sweltering city residents crammed the many summer resort areas in an effort to escape the sizzling heat. Up at Musselman's Lake on Sunday, the beaches were crowded and sunbathing space was at a premium. The water was literally "alive" with human beings and life-guards kept a constant watch on the milling most potent batsman, pounding crowd throughout the day.

Many people find many different ways to beat the heat. Some are satisfied to stretch out under their favorite tree in the backyard, some like to take a long drive into the country, some are satisfide to lay face-down in the sand and soak up the sun's rays while others just spend the day in the bathtub. Whatever means you may employ to escape the 90 degree temperatures for my money there's nothing like a cool dip in "the old swimming hole." That's the place where you are sure to meet all your friends who have gathered there for one purpose "to cool off."

A few years ago there were dozens of places to swim and it was common practice for everyone to go swimming during the pleasant summer nights. Times seem to have changed however. People are now content to take a quick shower at home or take a trip to the nearest lake. The old swimming hole now seems to be out of style.

During the past weekend however when the extreme heat sent the temperatures soaring into the nineties, young and old alike were satisfied to swim at the most convenient location. On the 5th concession of Markham, south of Dickson's Hill the intereset in the old swimming hole was renewed in a big way. From Stouffville, Markham and surrounding district people flocked to the small creek which cuts through the Jos. Kirk property. During the morning, afternoon and evening, men, women and children of all ages suddenly regained their swimming interest. Will the swimming hole popularity continue? It all depends on the weather.

As the swimming season is now in full swing the important point of water safety arises. Here is a list of rules which will help you avoid dangerous accidents in and around the water. The best way to avoid water accidents is to avoid the things

that cause these accidents. 1. Never let your pals kid or dare you into trying to swim farther or dive from a greater height than you are used to."

2. Always make sure you swim where people can see or hear you. Then, if you do get into trouble, there will be some one around to help you out.

3. No matter how strong a swimmer you are, you should never go for a long swim, unless you are accompanied by someone in a boat who is capable of pulling you to safety, if you get into trouble.

4. Never dive into water that you don't know all about. Go'in without diving and sink feet first to make your investiga-

. 5. Take a tip and swim along the shore. Don't go out into deep water and then turn to come back. It's just as much fun and it's a hundred percent safer.

: 6. Never laugh, and avoid chewing gum when in deep water -you may swallow water accidentally and start to choke.

7. If you like boating, learn to swim first. Never go out alone in a small boat if you can't swim. If children are in the boat, or non-swimmers, make sure you take along life preservers.

S. When using water wings or inner tubes, etc., if you can't swim, don't play in water out of your depth.

9. Make sure you go into the water slowly, taking a complete ducking or two before you do any swimming. :10. If you want to change seats in a boat, pull in to shore and

change there. .11. Obey the signs posted at your swimming pool or beach. 12. Start off the season slowly and get into condition before you attempt any long or fast swims.

13. Finally, remember this, you are your brother's keeper. We all have a definite responsibility to other people. So, whenever you are swimming or near the water, try to keep alert.

WHAT'S THE SPEED OF A SOFTBALL ?


