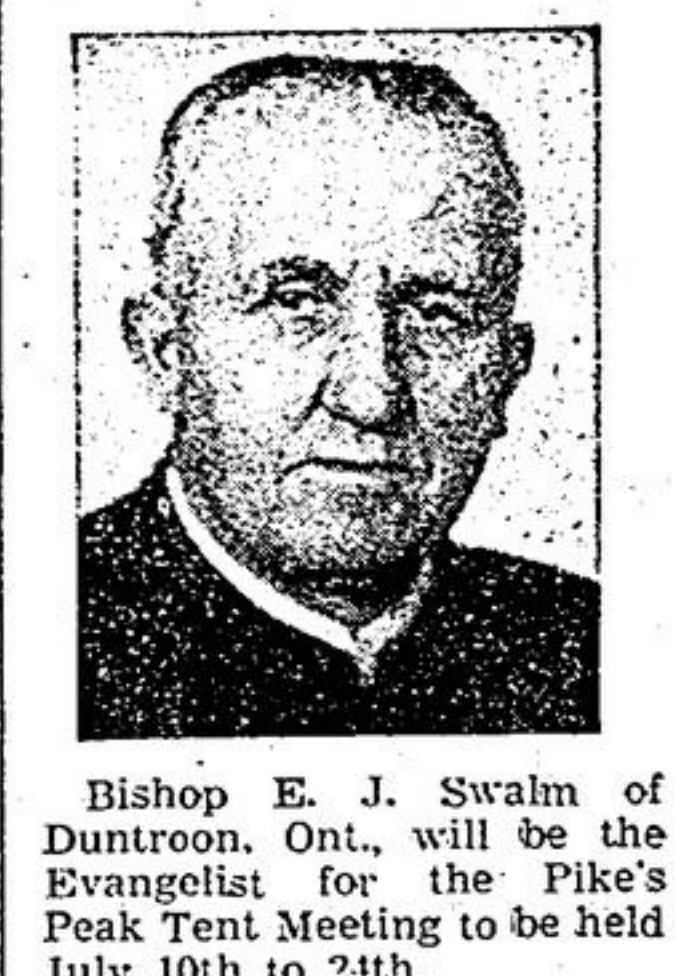
# American Interests Seek Markham Twp. Property

Reports of the purchase of the 600-acre Langstaff jail farm by a New York syndicate is "all news" to Reeve Alfred LeMasurier. The jail property, owned by Toronto and being rented to the Provincial Government for use as a mental hospital, was mentioned as the possible site of a \$30,000,000 industrial, commercial and residential site. A New York syndicate was reported to have offered the city \$1,300,000 for the site. "There have been all kinds of rumors about the property for the past few years," said Reeve LeMasurier, "and I know that a lot of people are interested in it—including Markham Township." The township council has long been interested in developing the area commercially and industrially to help lower the township tax burden, he said. "If anyone has made a firm offer for the property to the city, it would have to come before our planning board before any plans are finalized," he continued. The reeve said he had a letter from the Minister of Health indicating the Provincial Government was interested in the property. The property was a Toronto jail farm until the outbreak of World War II. At that time the prisoners were moved to Burwash and elsewhere and the farm became a mental hospital in place of one at St. Thomas, which became an RCAF station. "The property is on the east side of Yonge St. and runs north for about two miles from Highway 7 and east to Bayview Ave. The main line of the CNR runs through the middle of it. Reports said the U.S. syndicate planned to locate industrial plants on either side of the tracks, commercial frontage along Yonge St. and low-cost homes and apartments on the other parts of the property."
