Oh yes, I love my neighbor's dog That capers in my yard — But tied up to a tree at home, I'd love him twice as hard.

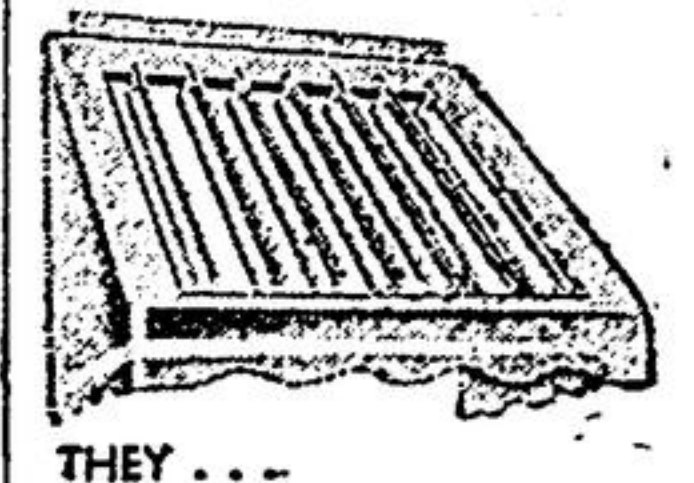
