CBC Plans Coverage Of Marilyn Bell Swim

Plans have been made to report Marilyn Bell's English Channel swim on both CBC radio and television.

Although some doubt still hangs over the actual date on which Marilyn will swim, the CBC has made plans to provide extensive coverage of this young Canadian's challenge of the Channel, including direct radio coverage of the beginning and conclusion, and a report on her progress about half way.

The CBC hopes to be able to beam shortwave, direct from a boat in the Channel, a description of events leading up to Marilyn's dive-in, 'live' to the Trans-Canada network, with the possibility of pre-swim interviews with Marilyn and her coach Gus Ryder.

Peach's scored three runs in the first inning, two in the second, four in the third, one in the fourth and three in the fifth.

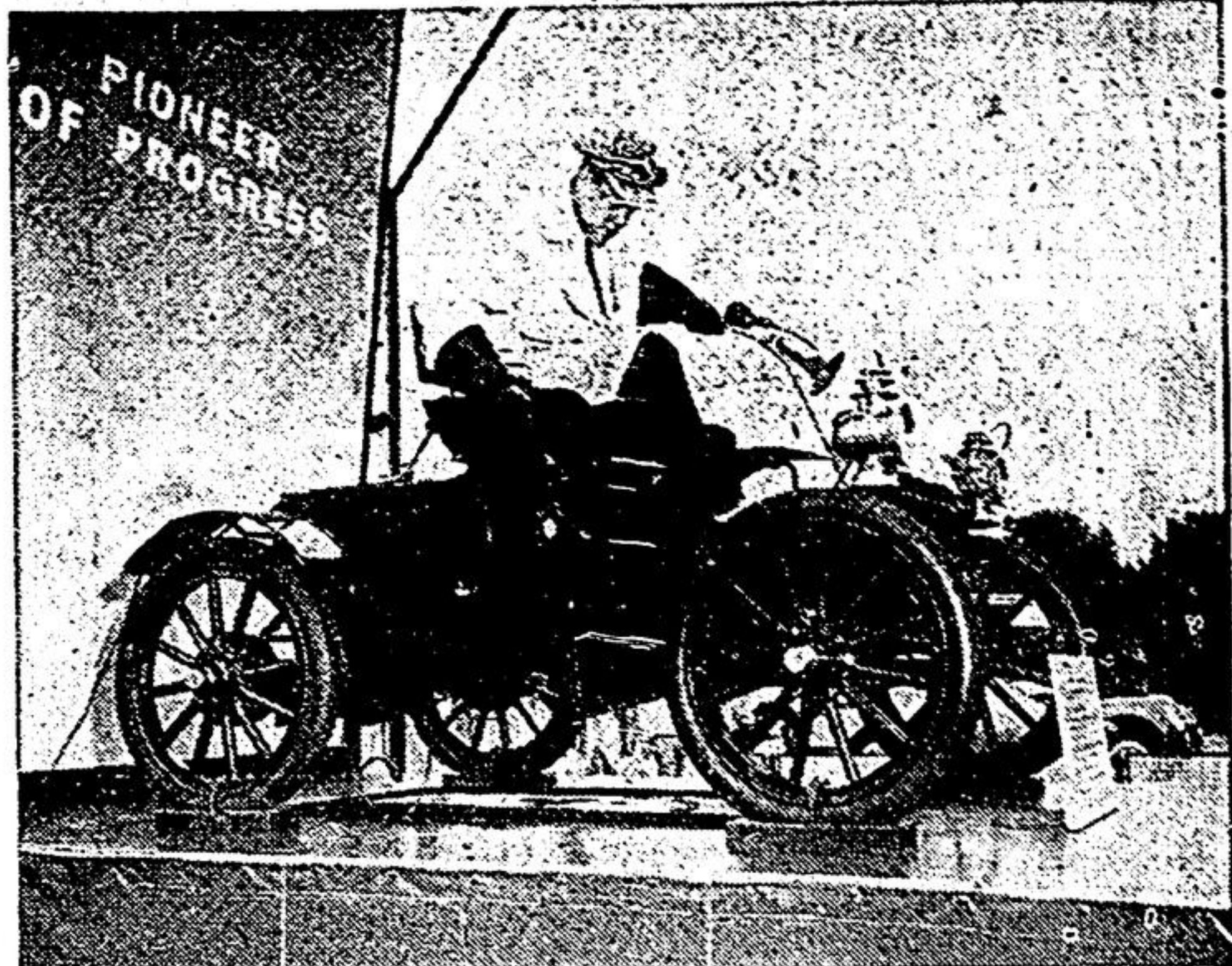
In the other scheduled contest, Agincourt downed Elgin Mills 10-5. Betty Brooks slammed two home runs for the winners.
