

P. S. Inspectorates Divided into Areas

Public School Inspectorates of York County have been divided into four, with York 1 and 2 being divided into three inspectorates, with the addition of E. M. Dunn, who for the past year has been assisting Inspector Maynard Hallman and W. J. McLeod, formerly of York 2 and 1 respectively. Mr. Dunn has been given his own territory as inspector of York 1. For the past three years, Inspector Maynard Hallman has been well known and highly regarded in King, Markham Twp. and Markham and Vaughan Area No. 1, as their school inspector. Mr. Hallman has been transferred to York 3, which now includes the villages of Markham and Stouffville, the Township of Markham and Markham and Vaughan Area No. 1.

W. J. McLeod, who begins his fourteenth year as a public school inspector in September, was formerly in York 1 which took in the municipalities of Richmond Hill, Aurora, Stouffville, Newmarket and Sutton, Whitechurch Township, the Georginas and North and East Gwillimbury. Mr. McLeod will now have York 2, which will include the Townships of King and Whitechurch, and the village of Richmond Hill.

Inspector Dunn will take Mr. McLeod's former inspectorate of York 1, less the villages of Richmond Hill and Stouffville and the Township of Whitechurch.

"We have worked together as a team, and our motto has been and will continue to be the best possible schools for the lowest possible cost," said Inspector Hallman when making the announcement of the change in inspectorates to the school trustees of King Twp. at a combined meeting with the Twp. Planning Board on Thursday night.
