FRUIT FRENCH DRESSING
1 cup salad oil; 1/2 cup lemon juice; 1/2 cup canned plum juice; 2 teaspoons sugar; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon paprika. Measure all ingredients into a jar and shake thoroughly. Chill several hours; shake well before serving with fruit salads. Yield — 1 cup.

CREAMY FRENCH DRESSING
1 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard; 3 tablespoons sugar; 3 tablespoons ketchup; 1/2 cup evaporated milk; 1/2 cup salad oil; 3 tablespoons vinegar. Measure all ingredients, except vinegar, into a mixing bowl. Beat until smooth and well blended. Add vinegar and beat until thoroughly mixed. Yield — 1 1/2 cups.

TOSSED SALAD
Fill a large bowl with a variety of crisp, well-drained greens broken into bite-size pieces. Shake creamy French Dressing well; pour a little over greens. Toss lightly until all greens glisten. Add more dressing and seasonings, if desired. Now add tomato wedges or pickled beets.
