MORE FACILITIES FOR EXHIBITORS AT THE "EX"

The exhibition grounds at Toronto will present a much improved look for the C.N.E. when it opens this year on August 26. A new dormitory is under construction, and is to be reserved for herdsmen who have livestock exhibited at the "Ex" or the Winter Fair. It is announced that the new building will have washroom facilities and showers on each floor, and a lounge will also be provided.

The old practice of having concessions in the grounds built by the exhibitors will be changed, with a whole row of booths being built this year as permanent buildings. In this way a better class of buildings is assured, and a more uniform appearance provided by the sleek row of buildings.

To make the "Ex" more national in scope, construction is underway of a row of ten arches—one for each of the provinces—which will be set up in front of the building where booths will depict the provinces across Canada.

Thus, while the affair has always been known as the Canadian National Exhibition, more ways are found each year to continue this national spirit.

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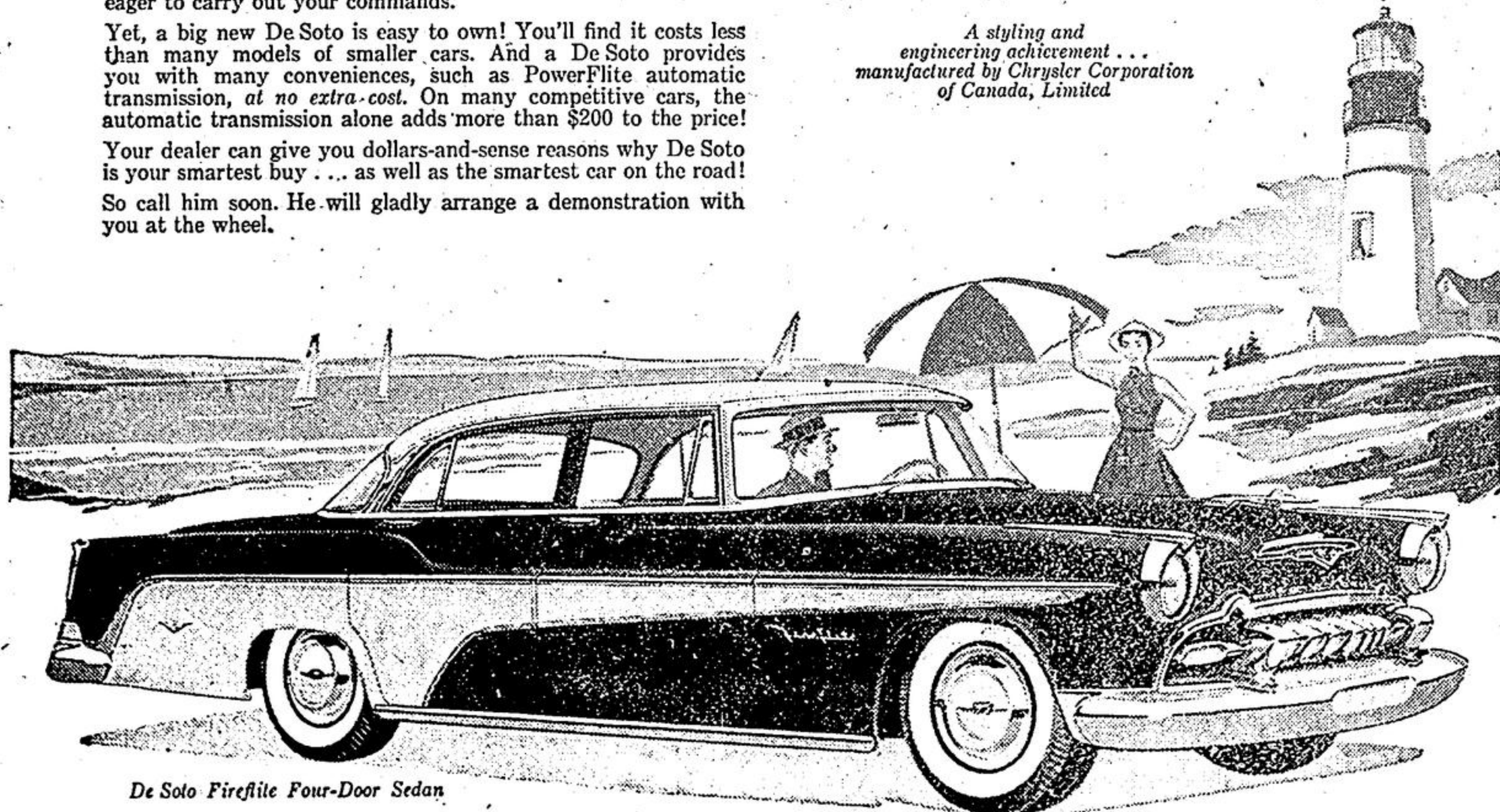
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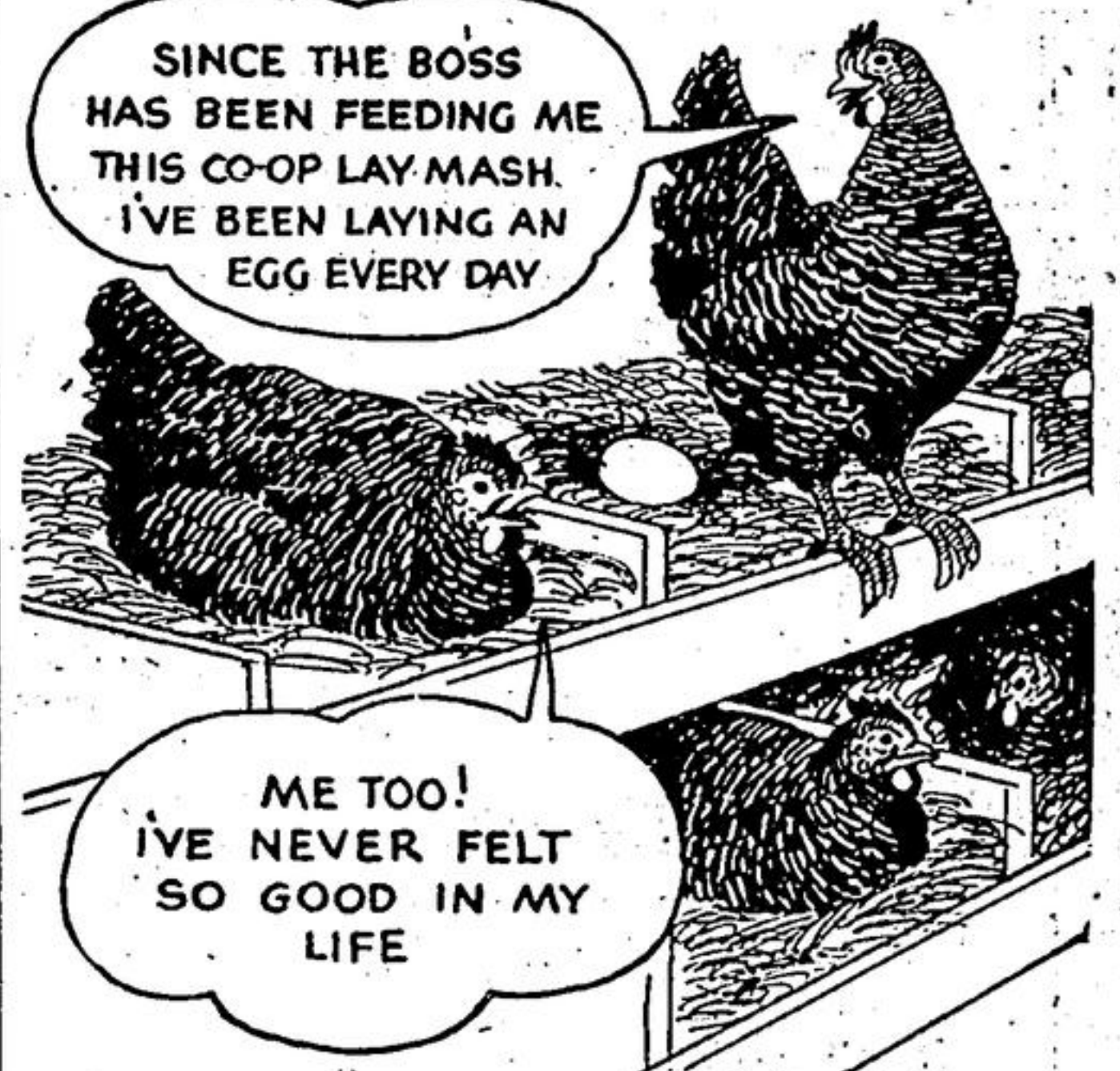
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
