

Sunday Night Traffic Count Reveals 639 Cars an Hour

With the help of some Ringwood friends, a check was made on Sunday evening of the amount of traffic passing this intersection on its weekly trek back to the city and the results were astounding. Between the hours of 8 and 10 in the evening 1378 cars passed this point, city-bound or an average of 639 an hour. The writer travelled north from the city on Sunday evening and saw traffic stopped from No. 7 highway north on the 8th con. to the Mt. Joy sideroad. Traffic was also stopped from No. 7 highway north on the 4th con. to Buttonville and on Yonge St. a double line reached from Thornhill almost to Richmond Hill.

Further figures were also observed on those obeying or disobeying the new "Stop" sign at Ringwood. Of the 1378 cars which passed through Ringwood, 314 failed to stop at the stop signs, 112 slowed slightly and changed gears, 9 were seen illegally passing (passing others while the car ahead was stopped for the "Stop" sign. Sixteen had no light over or under the rear license plate and 11 had only one headlight.
