Pickering Twp. Council Awards Water Contract

Pickering Township Council, at a special session last Monday, considered tenders submitted by seven contracting firms for the installation of trunk sewers and service connections to the first group of homes to be served by a new water supply system in the township.

The area known as Water Area No. 1, is in the southern part of the township, between the Toronto By-Pass (401 Highway) and the shore of Lake Ontario, and between Rouge River and the western limits of the township. Target day for the first flow of water to 17 initial 150 residents is November 1st. The engineers fully expect that this aim can be realized, barring serious unforeseen delays.

In considering the tenders submitted, council asked for an opinion as to the respective merits of cast iron pipe and cement asbestos. Mr. Redfern, for his construction company, stated that they both met engineering standards, with the cement-asbestos type being much cheaper. Council then agreed to employ this type of piping, and awarded to the Maring Construction Company the contract for the installation of mains, at their bid of \$100,100.50. The same company submitted a bid of \$106,683.20 for the same work, using cast iron pipe. Other bidding firms showed the same ratio of savings, but in each case were not able to meet the lower price submitted by the successful contractor. High bid was in the amount of \$150,517.50 (with \$155,558 quoted in the alternate cast iron specifications). Two other firms submitted offers ranging between these two sets of figures.

All seven of the interested firms sent in bids for the connection to houses, with Ellins Construction Co. receiving the nod from council at a figure of \$2,504.40. Here again figures varied widely, ranging upwards from this, the lowest

offer, to a high figure of \$5,340.

With many interested residents present at the meeting council under the chairmanship of the deputy-reeve Bill Newman, pointed out that the initial costs of the new service would be borne by subdividers in the area, who were willing to pay enough through fees to the township to make the scheme feasible.

It was stressed that great thought had been given to the entire question, with a cheap and immediate source of water the basis for the development. An infiltration gallery will be the source of supply for the water. This is to be located close to the lake, and will be a concrete box-like structure which will be constantly filled by water from the lake, after it filters through the sand and stone. This system was regarded as preferable to building a more costly intake system and filtration plant at the start, since the number of subscribers to the water system would not immediately warrant this outlay.

Questions from the residents were cleared up at this point, when Mr. Redfern pointed out that pure water would be assured from this system. He assured the ratepayers that other towns studied reported satisfactory and pure water for periods ranging from ten years to forty, in the case of Stoney Creek.

The system has been planned as a self-supporting scheme from the small beginning of 150 services, and councillors estimated that water would cost no more than that in adjoining municipalities. An initial fee of \$272 per foot of frontage will be levied on streets as mains are installed, and council assured the public that no further costs will be incurred beyond the costs of piping from the lot line to the home, and the cost of meters which will be installed in each home.

Ardeni Bowler Edward Goodman Dies in Oshawa.

A well-known local sportsman, Mr. Edward J. Goodman, died suddenly on Saturday at Oshawa General Hospital. He was in his 69th year.

Mr. Goodman was taken ill a few days after playing in the bowling tournament for the D. W. Read Trophy, on the greens of the Oshawa Club, on Aug. 1. He had been in hospital for about two weeks.

Born in Canton, Hope Twp., Mr. Goodman was the son of William and Lesia Goodman and he married the former Meta Gregory in Oshawa in 1913.

He had lived in Oshawa for 42 years and was employed by Fittings Limited for 45 years, retiring from his post as superintendent of the pattern shop in 1933. He was a member of King Street United Church for 35 years and was secretary of the Sunday School and a member of the official board.

A life member of the Cedar Lodge, AF and AM, he was P.G. of the Phoenix Lodge, IOOF, and served as District Deputy of Ontario District No.
