POWER TO BURN

The more than 300 spectators who attended the Stouffville-Lindsay baseball semi-final in the park on Monday evening saw the power-packed Red Sox unleash a batting attack, the like of which has not been seen here for many a season. Both at the plate and in the field they turned in a superb performance. In the last meeting here between the two teams, Lindsay rolled over the homesters to the tune of 9-2 but on Monday night the shoe was on the other foot. Lorne Schell, Stouffville's master moundman had the Lindsay batsmen eating out of his hand. In spite of a long layoff, his control was almost perfect as he walked only one man in the entire nine innings. His sharp-breaking curve balls had some of the most potent batters confused and fans standing behind the screen remarked on the amount of "stuff" packed into some of his pitches. Behind the plate, Don Haynes, the Red Sox rookie receiver looked like a veteran. He kept the Lindsay base runners on their toes and on three occasions picked off players who underestimated his bullet-like accuracy. Ken Schell, Bob Hassard, Bud Lehman and Les Clarke set up an air-tight infield while Ted Cadieux, Murray McMullen and George Stark patrolled the outfield with errorless efficiency. At the plate, the homesters turned an ordinarily tight playoff contest into a nightmare of triples, doubles and singles for three Lindsay pitchers. The Stouffville batsmen pounded out a total of 23 hits, enough satelites to win two normal games.

Well, the Red Sox have met, and crossed the first barrier toward retaining the Tri-County League silverware for another year. The next opposition will be either Sunderland or Port Perry. If the local squad can keep up their present playoff pace, it'll take an extra good team to steal away that coveted cup.

Start Early

The local batsmen had no intentions of letting the series drag out to a third and final game. A walk to lead-off batter Bob Hassard and an error on Les Clarke's infield ground ball allowed the first Stouffville run to cross the plate. The Red Sox sewed up the game in the second inning. A total of 12 batters paraded to the plate and whacked out four singles and three doubles to knock starting pitcher Harold Williams off the mound.

No Relief

Relief twirler Jack DeBois took over on the hill from Williams but the hungry homesters continued their hard-hitting attack. In the fourth inning Ted Cadieux, Geo. Stark and Les Clarke received free passes, Don Haynes and Lorne Schell singled, Ken Schell and Bud Lehman doubled and Bob Hassard blasted a triple with the bases loaded to push seven more runs across the plate and run the total into the double figures.
