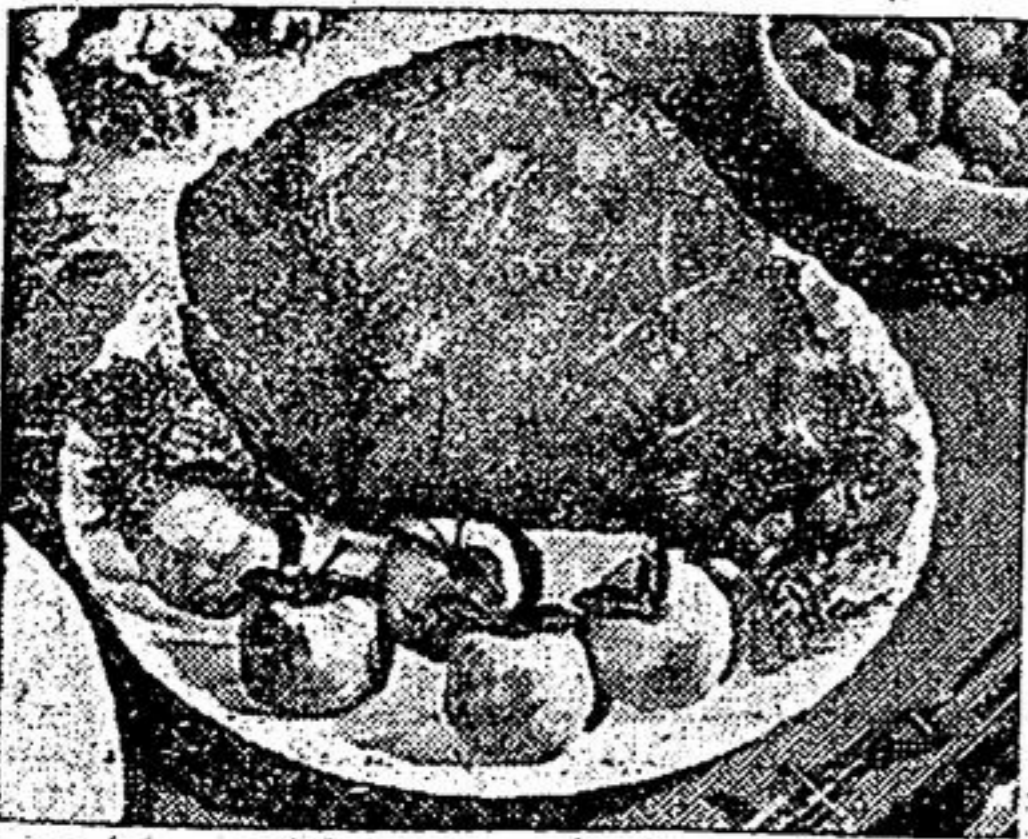

Livestock Entry List Heavy at C.N.E.

The heavy horses and heavy cattle are making a big showing this year at the Canadian National Exhibition which opened August 26. Cattle entries in the big CNE livestock show are up about 10 percent from other years, with beef animals leading the parade. Heavy increases in entries have been noted in shorthorns, Herefords, Aberdeen Angus and fat cattle, while other beef animals have held largely to the levels of other years. In the dairy cattle there has been a sharp increase in Ayrshire entries and also in Holsteins, which are always a big entry at the Ex. The Guernsey entry is expected to show increases due to the presence of Ed Sullivan, grandstand headliner who, as a fellow breeder, will present top awards for this breed. Sheep entries are about the same this year in all 10 breeds, but there has been a heavy increase in swine entries. The poultry and pet stock show promises to be bigger and better than ever, with almost 600 more entries listed for this section of the fair. Dairy products too, have a heavy entry, with plenty of emphasis on butter and cheese.
