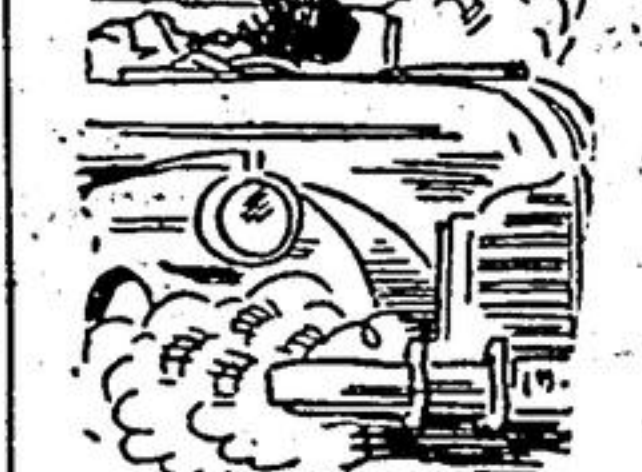

WEED INSPECTOR DRAWS REBUKE FROM RATEPAYER

Arising from these occasions, the writer wished to question the charges for weed cutting, and the attitude of the inspector. Council instructed clerk Chas. Hoover to obtain a report from the weed inspector, for presentation to council, and to acknowledge the letter received from Mr. Boyle.

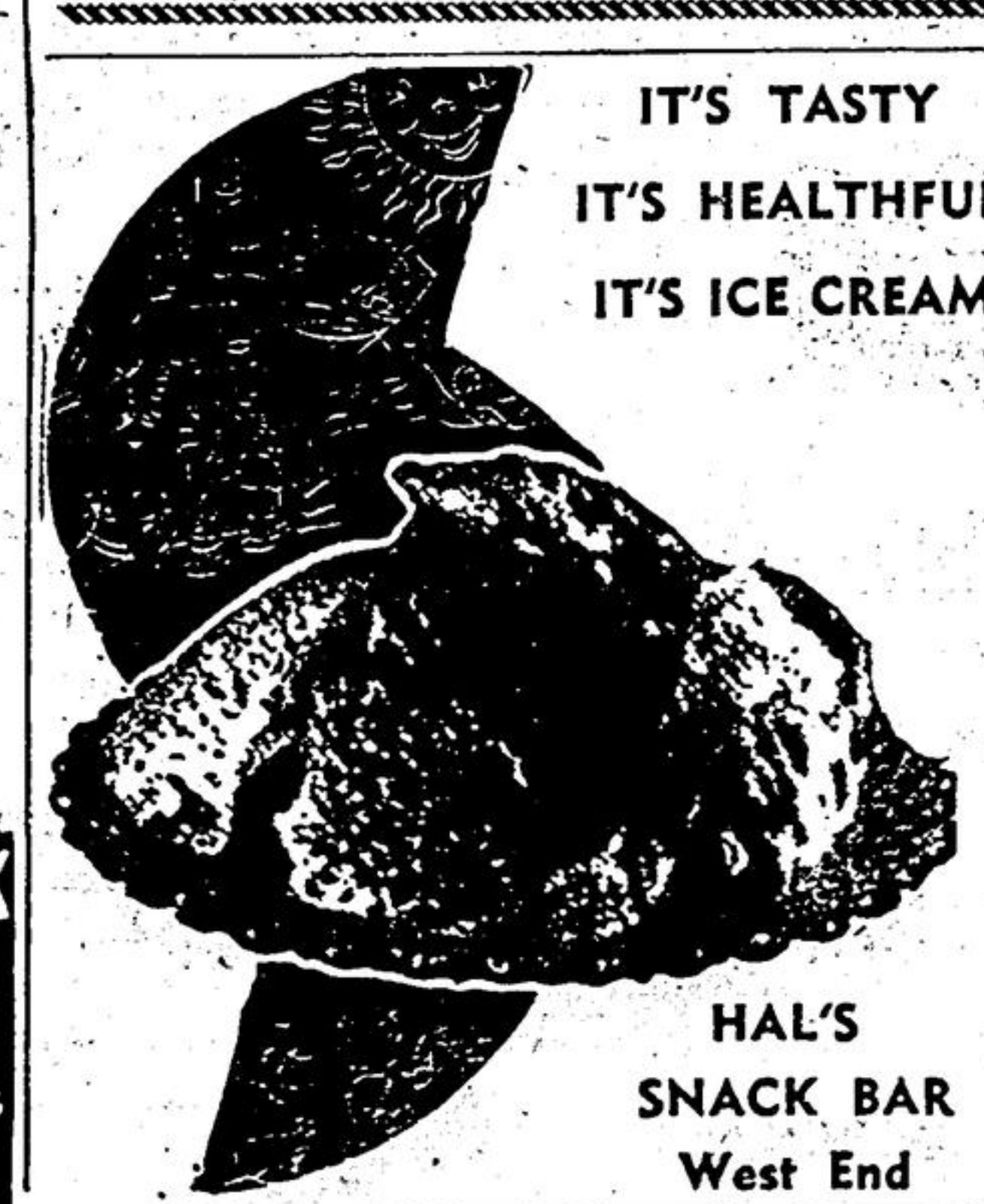
