Uxbridge Township Council, which met this week in regular session at Goodwood, was faced with seven claims for sixteen sheep and one ewe reported as killed by wolves or dogs during the month of August in the township.

Value of the ewe killed was set at \$15 by the valuator, while the average claim for each sheep was about \$20. Total amount for the animals was \$345, while fees submitted by valuers was \$21. Council approved payment by the township of the total of \$366.
