Dates Set For Fall Ploing Matches

Ont. County will hold their Junior Ploing Match this year on Saturday, Oct. 1. The event will take place on the farm of Russell Morrison of Beaverton. On Wednesday, Oct. 5, the Ploing Match for the northern part of Ontario County will be held in Uxbridge Township, on the farm of John Kydd.

Later on in the season—Oct. 11, 12, 13 and 14—this year's International Ploing Match will be held in South-western Ontario, at Blytheswood, near Leamington. The International is sponsored by the Ontario Ploingmen's Association, and this year's event promises to be one of the largest in the long history of the association. WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT CANCER

(This is the first of four articles written especially for women by The Canadian Cancer Society.)

Almost one out of every 3 Canadian Women questioned as to the curability of cancer held the opinion that cancer was never cured.

This fact came to light during a nation-wide poll including some 3,000 women conducted by Canadian Gallup Poll representative for the Canadian Cancer Society. Since lay education is one of the major aspects of the Cancer Society's program, it was necessary to discover just how much Canadian women know about the disease and in what particular areas their misinformation — if any — lies.

The survey revealed startling differences in the cancer knowledge of the women in different provinces and to a remarkable extent reflected the extent of Cancer Society organization in different areas.

The questions asked of the women were in four basic categories. The first questions dealt with the general attitudes to serious diseases. The second group were designed to ascertain just how much knowledge the women possessed concerning cancer of breast and womb. The third group reflected the attitude towards the causes and treatment of cancer and the fourth group dealt with personal experience with the disease.

Discuss Findings This article will discuss the findings from group number 1 while subsequent articles will deal with the other phases of the survey.

In the first category the women were asked which disease is responsible for the most deaths. Forty-five percent of the total number of women questioned stated that cancer was the leading cause of death. Only 40% thought heart disease was the worst killer and 9% named tuberculosis. Actually, according to the latest vital statistics reports, deaths from heart trouble are approximately twice as great as those attributed to cancer. Cancer is the second commonest-cause of death and it
