

Musselman Cottagers Air Municipal Grievances

Reports from Musselman's Lake indicate that the four associations of cottagers at that resort have enjoyed a very active season and have received the support of a greater proportion of the holidayers than ever. At the south end of the lake in particular, their numbers have been increased by many permanent residents. At the end of the summer season, it was decided to call a meeting of residents of the area,

with a view to determining the most urgent needs of the community, and of finding the best way to present their grievances to the Township of Whitchurch. Accordingly, a meeting was called at the community hall on the north side one Sunday afternoon recently, at which about 75 were in attendance. Chairman for the meeting was A. E. Stanton, president of the South Shore Association,

who stressed that there was no reason why harmony could not prevail between the cottagers concentrated in this area, and the farmers who formed the bulk of the township population. Mr. Stanton introduced Mr. John C. Wylie, a public accountant, formerly a city resident, and now living the year around at Musselman's. A movement is on foot to secure Mr. Wylie's nomination as a

candidate for office on the Whitchurch Township Council at the forthcoming elections, and Mr. Wylie spoke of his hopes to secure a fair deal for this area, as well as the township as a whole. The chairman then invited Mr. Cliff Wallwork to speak as a representative of the township council. Mr. Wallwork was faced with a barrage of questions from the audience, which consisted almost entirely of To-

ronto residents who owned cottages at the lake. There was a general feeling that little value was received by owners in return for their payment of taxes, and Mr. Wallwork explained that the council apportioned the money available for the good of the township as a whole. He revealed the amount of his own tax and that of other members of the township as an example that the lake area was not the only section faced with high taxes. To statements that there seemed to be no set pattern for assessment, Mr. Wallwork replied that the township, like many other municipalities in Ontario, were seeking to initiate a method of measured assessment. It had been hoped to install this system this year, but due to the magnitude of the undertaking, many delays had been encountered. The garbage collection question was also discussed, with residents questioning why the pick-up had been cut off so early this year. It was claimed that in other years the service had been provided until the end of September. Mr. Wallwork promised to bring this question up in council. Other subjects of complaint were the heavy truck traffic at the lake, with gravel trucks allegedly speeding through the holiday centre, and the lack of repairs to lake roads, with repairs, if any, being done after the summer season was over. It was also claimed that Toronto residents were not able to take part in the township elections, but Mr. Wallwork stated that the former closing time for the polls had been extended to 8 o'clock, for the benefit of those who worked or lived in Toronto. A member of the audience came to his assistance with the statement that residents of Toronto had ample time to reach the polls by 8. Mr. Wallwork also explained the setup of the township council, and answered questions dealing with voting by ratepayers and nomination of candidates. Mr. Rollins, of the Preston Lake cottagers association, was in attendance as an observer. He indicated that residents in that area would support the candidate endorsed by the meeting. It was understood that residents at Lake Wilcox would also endorse this candidate. Mr. Wallwork stated that there was nothing to prevent Mr. Wylie or anyone else from running for council, but he stressed that in order to be elected, he would need the support of the electors, and wished him luck should his name be on the ballots.

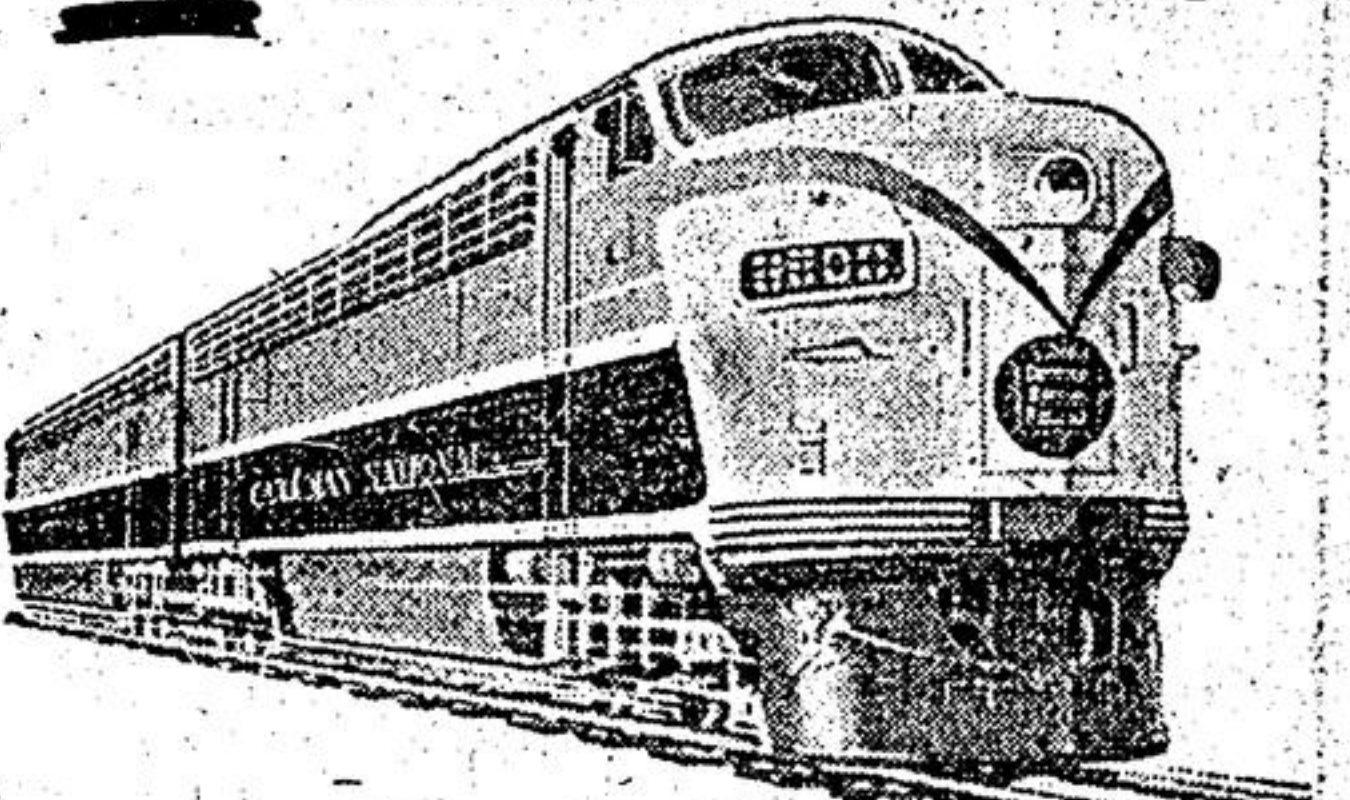
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
