

Markham Gives Up Two Games to Brooklin

Doug James' Markham Aces bowed out of the OASA Intermediate "C" playoffs last week when they dropped 2 straight games to Brooklin Stevenson Motors 10-6 and 5-1. Markham had earned the right to meet Brooklin by beating Unionville, Georgetown and Cooksville. The winners now move into the Ontario semi-finals and will play Warton.

Brooklin were in the driver's seat from the opening inning, hitting the first home run of the game. "Peg" O'Neill on the mound for the homeesters was given unusually poor fielding support as the Aces committed four errors in the first five innings. The winners jumped into the lead on singles by Graham and Johnston and a home run clout by Bill Harper. Kivell was safe on an error and later scored when Croxall connected for a single. In the second inning two errors, two singles and a double increased Brooklin's lead. They added two runs in the fifth and ninth innings. Markham counted their first runs in the second inning when, with two out, an error, a double by Harry Young and another error on Don Brown's infield grounder pushed two runs across the plate. In the third inning Markham squeezed one run in. Petch opened with a double and John Lawrenson tagged pitcher Fred Brown with a single driving in the front runner.

In the fifth inning John Lawrenson clouted a three bagger and scored on an infield error. In the seventh, Morley Petch opened with a double and scored on a passed ball, and a single by Lloyd Raymer. Harry Young with three hits was Markham's best batsman. Morley Petch, John Lawrenson & Don Brown each had two safeties.

In the second game of the best of three series, Brooklin eked out a tight 5-4 decision. The Aces came very close to extending the series to a third game, when they pulled to within one run of the Brooklinites and had a man on second with nobody out, but they couldn't

MINERALS
The human body requires about fourteen minerals for its general maintenance. These are: calcium, the most important of the fourteen, which aids in making bones and teeth and is essential to the regular beating of the heart and clotting of the blood. Milk and cheese are the chief sources of calcium. Phosphorus is also necessary to the formation of bones and teeth and is found in milk products, egg yolk, fish and cereals. Iron forms the haemoglobin in the red blood cells and helps to prevent anaemia and is obtained from liver, kidney, heart, egg yolk, dried fruits and whole grain cereal. The sources of iodine are salt water fish, cod liver oil and iodized salt. This mineral prevents simple goitre.
