**HERE ARE THE SIMPLE RULES and INSTRUCTIONS**

1. This contest is open only to persons living in Canada. More than one in a family may participate, but only one entry will be accepted from each person.

2. This is a contest of skill in solving a puzzle. Neatness in handwriting and legibility of numbers are of no importance. All entries become the property of IGA and there is no responsibility accepted for receiving or returning an entry.

3. Entries to be accepted must appear on the Official entry form provided. These forms will appear in this newspaper each week with the final puzzle form appearing on the 4th week.

4. All entries must be submitted to an IGA market before 6 P.M. Saturday, November 12, 1955. Entries must be placed in one of the official sealed boxes in each IGA store for that purpose.

5. Contest entries will be judged by a Board of Judges (not connected with IGA organization) and their credit will be final.

6. Every contestant agrees to accept the decision of the Board of Judges as final without dispute and to be governed by these rules and conditions.

7. Should ties between contestants occur, the Board of Judges will recommend a further means of skilled competition to decide the final winners. All contestants agree to accept the decision form of the breaker, should it be necessary.

8. Employees, store owners, of IGA and their immediate families are not eligible.

**Puzzle Instructions**

There will be four puzzles appearing in this newspaper for four consecutive weeks. Each puzzle is part of your entry and must be kept to submit with your final solution. A final entry form will appear in our newspaper on the fourth week. The ad will appear each Thursday.

The object is to work out a continuous chain in such a way that when the figures are added together you will have the LOWEST possible total.

A continuous line must be drawn clearly in ink. Your line may start at any number and continue in any direction so long as the finished chain includes no more numbers than are indicated for each week's puzzle. The first week your chain should link 12 numbers, second week 18, third 24 and fourth and final week 30 numbers.

There must be no break in your chain. Your line must go each time to the numbers above, below, alongside, or diagonally positioned.

The chain must not cross or return to any number already included (see example chart).
