Single Acre Yields 304 Bushels of Hybrid Corn

Lamar Ratliff, a teenage boy, city Agent, and James W. Ar- and subsoiled. Fifty loads of G-711 in the last four years. for made hybrid corn history this year. Assistant County Agent measure were applied, with 1000 pounds of 14-14-11 fertilizer and 225 pounds of ammonium nitrate. Corn was planted with a one-way planter, in 30-inch rows, and thinned to a stand estimated at 25,850 plants. The crop was cultivated twice. It was not irrigated. Heavy plant population, high fertility and exceptional care in preparing the field contributed to the new world record. Lamar's measured acre, on the farm of his father, Paul Ratliff, has now produced a grand total of 903 bushels of Funk's G-711, a yellow hybrid which has set many yield records and is widely used in the Corn Belt and Mid-South, to break the 300-bushel mark for the first time in history. Lamar's field was measured, and the yield weighed and checked by W. T. Smith, County Agent, and James W. Ar-

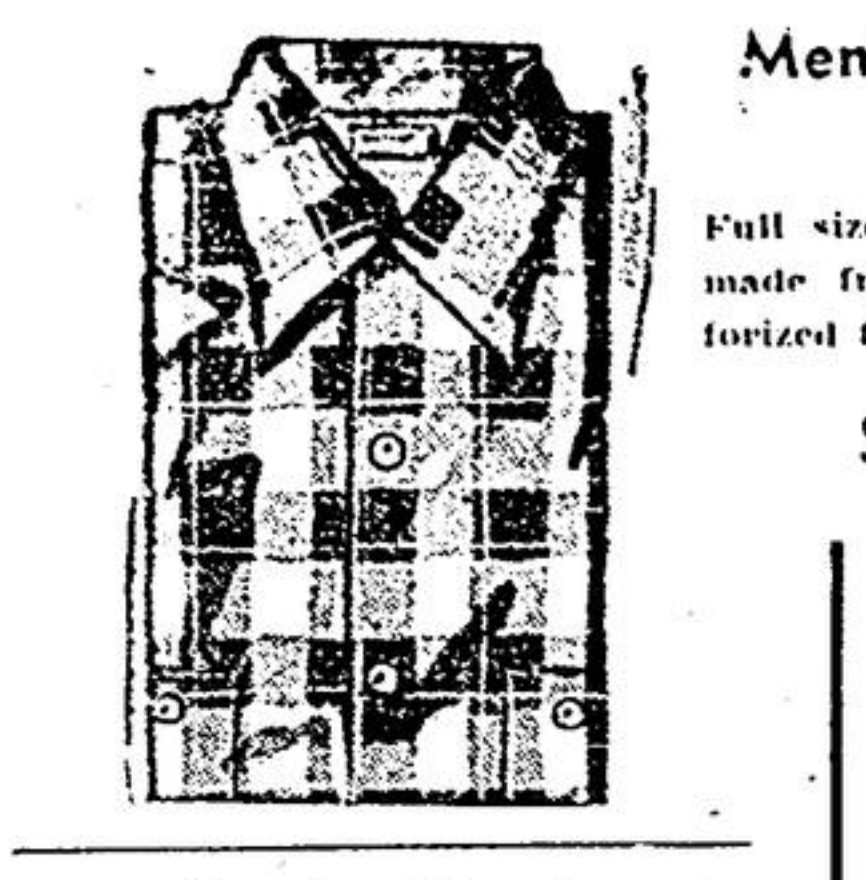
