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Two Surviving Ministers Conduct Anniversary Services at Mt. Pisgah

On Sunday, October 23, two full congregations gathered in worship to celebrate the 85th Anniversary of Mt. Pisgah United Church. This church was built on the third concession of Whitchurch about 3 miles north of the townline, in 1870, and opened for worship on Wednesday, Oct. 13, 1870, with special Sunday Services beginning on October 23. Rev. Morley Punchon opened and dedicated this church at that time and named it Mt. Pisgah.

The only two surviving ministers who have preached at this church over the years, conducted the two services. Rev. Garnet Lynde, the speaker in the morning, recalled many old memories and conducted the re-dedication service. Over the past year insulstone siding has been put on the church by Mr. Loy Carr, in memory of his parents who attended this church. The new roofing was donated by Mr. Stevens of Toronto who owns property nearby.

The outside decorating was done by a local painter, Mr. K. Offenbeck and was sponsored by Mr. W. H. Smith, formerly of this nearby community, now has a representative on the board. After the board approves names submitted they are filed with relative information and marked on reference maps in a way that error or confusion may be eliminated in future maps and publications.

Funds for Health Unit Come From Three Main Sources

Funds for operating the York County health unit come from three main sources. In 1955, York County Council budgeted \$57,000, which will be matched dollar for dollar by the Provincial Government. In addition, direct Federal Health grants, for special services, amount to approximately \$28,000. A fourth source of funds, plumbing inspection fees, enables the operation of the plumbing inspection program to continue on a self-sustaining basis apart from other health unit services.

Thus the local taxpayer supplies only \$57,000 directly to the York County Health Unit, or less than 83 cents per person for the entire year. In comparison with other full-time health services throughout the province, this is considered to be an amazingly low operating figure.

A full-time health service, operating 24 hours a day, with special-trained medical officers, public health nurses and sanitary inspectors, such as the York County Health Unit provides, would be virtually impossible for any local municipality to provide because of the high local costs. Local high costs are avoided by a co-operative health unit between a number of municipalities. For example, take the largest municipality and the biggest contributor to the York County Health Unit, the township of Markham, which will contribute through County Council approximately \$9,000 in 1955 for the health unit. If Markham township attempted to supply the same service on an equal scale to the York County Health Unit, it would involve three public health nurses, one sanitary inspector, one medical officer of health, a plumbing inspector, and other personnel and facilities amounting to a conservative estimate of more than \$17,000. Markham township gets all these services and more for approximately \$9,000.

ONT. TAKES TOP HONORS AT CHICAGO

Ontario breeders captured many of the top awards at the International Dairy Exposition which was held recently at Chicago.

Thirty Ontario cattle were represented in the Holstein section, with 26 of them being in the money. The Grand Champion Bull, Rockwood Rocket Tone 205233 was exhibited by the Quinte Dist. Cattle Breeding Association of Belleville, where he is being used at artificial service. He is now about 8 years of age and has sired over 10,000 calves during his lifetime. Incidentally he also won grand championships honors at his great dairy exposition in 1952 and in 1953.

Hector Astengo of Rosaf Farms, Brampton, was declared the premium breeder and premier exhibitor. Among the prizes won by his herd were: — 1st prize get of sire, on the get of A.B.C. Reflection Sovereign; 1st prize in the class for the 3 best cows bred by the exhibitor, and 1st prize in the produce of dam class.

J. J. E. McCague, Alliston, had the reserve Junior Champion female on his first prize Junior yearling heifer. A heifer from the herd of Jack Fraser of Streetsville stood second in this strong class, while another Fraser heifer won the calf class.

Perhaps the most notable victory, so far as the province is concerned, was gained when Ontario won the State-Herd Class. Ontario Ayrshire breeders did even better, winning
