Miss Reesor has been working with the Sudan Interior Mission in Nigeria since 1941. Engaged in medical work at a "bush" dispensary 150 miles from the railroad, Miss Reesor cared for babies that might otherwise have been left to die. The orphanage family now numbers 92.
