Passes a 2nd Hand Bylaw

Meeting in session in the council chambers last week, the town council passed a by-law to provide for the licensing and regulating of commercial dealers in second-hand articles.

The goods in question comprise clothing, auto parts, and any other salvage materials, and the new by-law provides for an annual licence fee of \$20. The by-law took effect upon its final approval last Friday, but in fairness to those individuals engaged in these businesses, no licence fee will be levied for the balance of this year.

The chief object of the new regulations is to provide for control of such operations, and to provide more rigid checks for purchase and re-sale of stolen goods.

Councillors made express provision to exempt churches with navy accessories and a corsage of pink roses and white mums.
