Twenty-five delegates from the Uxbridge congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses will attend a three-day assembly at Oshawa November 18-20. ## York County Council Supports Proposal for East-West Highway

York County Council went on record last week in support of an east-west highway to connect No. 9 at Schomberg with Greenbank at No. 7 highway. Alfred LeMasurier, reeve of Markham township and chairman of the special roads committee, in presenting a report to council said, "County council cannot assume any more highway responsibilities. But we do give the Newmarket Chamber of Commerce our 100 per cent co-operation in urging the province to take on this east-west highway."

"The road in question was discussed last year," added Jack Rye, reeve of East Gwillimbury township. "Under ordinary circumstances it would have been accepted as a county road, but when we were asking for relief from the undue burden placed on us by the forming of Metropolitan Toronto we were in no position to assume more roads."

Reeve James Murray, Aurora, voiced the only objection at the meeting. He said that while he favored an east-west highway, the route as mapped out from Schomberg along Davis Drive to Greenbank was not the right one. Mr. Murray had advocated for some time, the placing of an east-west highway so that it would go through Aurora.

In reply to Mr. Murray, Reeve Elton Armstrong of King township said that the route as endorsed by the Newmarket Chamber of Commerce was a "natural one." There is only a short distance of rough terrain in the Glenville area, he explained, and with present road engineering methods, it would present no problem.

"There is a great need for an east-west artery to serve this area," Mr. Armstrong added. It would be a convenience for the people of my own township as they have to take an indirect route for east-west travel, but it would be much more than that. It would ease traffic congestion on No. 7 highway and would be a benefit to the province in providing a direct route from Lake Huron to eastern Ontario.

Mr. Armstrong continued, "The Chambers of Commerce should only have to lend us their support and not have to lead in the project. The least we can do is to give them our complete co-operation. Let's get behind it."

Reeve Roy Pollock of North Gwillimbury, supported Mr. Armstrong's arguments in favor of the route. "The need for an east-west highway is urgent. We should let the provincial department of highways know our views on the subject," Mr. LeMasurier said that such a resolution had been forwarded to the Minister of Highways already. It was sent after the June session of County council.

### Many Canadian Entries at Chicago Show

Canadian stockmen will be prominently represented at the 1955 International Live Stock Exposition and Horse Show to be held in Chicago from Nov. 25 to Dec. 3, the management reports.

The show will mark its 56th annual renewal this year in the 10-acre International Amphitheatre, largest show building in the United States, and in pens of the nearby livestock market.

Three Ontario Aberdeen-Angus breeders have listed entries for the Chicago show, annually the largest competition of this popular breed in North America. They are Col. D. B. Weldon, of Middlesex, with a show herd of 15 animals; Edwards Brothers of Arva and Waford; and Malcolm M. Bailey of Uxbridge.

C. Carman Lyons, of Wallace-town, Ont., is exhibiting a herd of purebred Herefords in a special showing of this breed at Chicago this year, designated by the American Hereford Association, the Jess C. Andrew Memorial Hereford Show in honor of the late President of the Exposition.

There will be nine exhibition herds of purebred Shorthorns from Ontario at Chicago this year, according to officials of the show, Louada Manor Farm at Peterboro has entered a show herd of 17 head in the Shorthorn competitions where they exhibited four blue ribbon winners and the reserve junior champion bull here last year.

S. G. Bennett, of Georgetown, has entered a herd of 14 purebred Shorthorns. Others exhibiting this breed are M. H. Pimmitt and Son, of Indian River; W. H. Merry, of Milton; George Isaby, Guelph; A. C. McDermott, Goodwood; Terrence Beardmore of Mono Mills; R. F. McKinlay and Son, Mar-ple; and T. C. Amos, of Moffat.

From Nova Scotia a show flock of purebred Hampshire sheep is being sent to the International show.

Six prominent Ontario purebred sheep breeders have also listed entries. Emke Brothers of Elmwood will exhibit Oxford, Hampshires, and Shropshires; Raymond B. Comfort, of St. Anna, Shropshires; George S. Brien and Son, Ridgetown, Shropshires; and F. W. Gurney, of Paris, Shropshires.

Don Head Farms at Richmond Hill, exhibitors of the champion Southdown rams at last year's Chicago show, has entered a flock of 15 head in the classes for this breed, the show management reports; and Clarence Knight, of Kent, will also exhibit Southdowns.

Canadian crop producers have listed many entries in the 33rd International Grain and Hay show, held in conjunction with the Exposition, and in which many champion awards have gone to Canadian growers in past years.

### Keeps Pace with County Growth



"We can save money if we do it now," said C. A. (Tiny) Cathers, chairman of the York County Memorial Hospital Building Fund, in making two important announcements this week.

First was that the campaign which has been under way for many months, designed to extend the hospital in Newmarket, from 52 to 109 beds and provide other badly-needed facilities, had been a success. The goal of \$600,000 had been exceeded, he said, by a considerable amount. Cash donations and pledges amounted to \$669,573.

Second announcement concerned a decision to undertake further work, bringing the extension up to its maximum usefulness. It had been planned not to finish the third floor of the extension at the present time but it has been discovered that a considerable amount of money could be saved if the work were completed while other work on the building was being done.

Total cost of the extension included finishing and equipping of the third floor would cost \$90,000 more. Government grants would, said Mr. Cathers, take care of approximately \$10,000 of this, leaving \$80,000 to be raised over and above the money at present in hand. Total cost of the completed extension would be \$749,000.

Finishing of the third floor would provide an additional operating room and other facilities. Final result would be to give the hospital 109 beds instead of 52, modern kitchen and cafeteria facilities, two operating rooms and other adjuncts. Installation of the elevator would be speeded up, with the whole job being completed by Christmas.

No general campaign such as that conducted some time ago would be undertaken, said Mr. Cathers, but the 'special names' drive now under way would be continued. It was possible that a campaign would be staged in the Bradford - Holland Marsh area, where Hurricane Hazel disrupted collection efforts a year ago. Private subscriptions would be welcome, it was indicated.

Highlights of the campaign to date has been its low cost. Administrative expenses, to raise the present total of \$669,573, had only been \$268,73. Mr. Cathers paid tribute to local newspapers and others who, by contributing advertising and supplies, had kept the figure low.

Emphasizing the need for making the hospital as efficient as possible, Mr. Cathers pointed out that the demand for hos-

pital services was increasing rapidly with the population growth of the surrounding area. Doctors were making use of it more and more, as facilities were improved. Indicating that the hospital is being used to a greater-than-ever degree by district residents, he said that well over 100 babies were born therein last month.

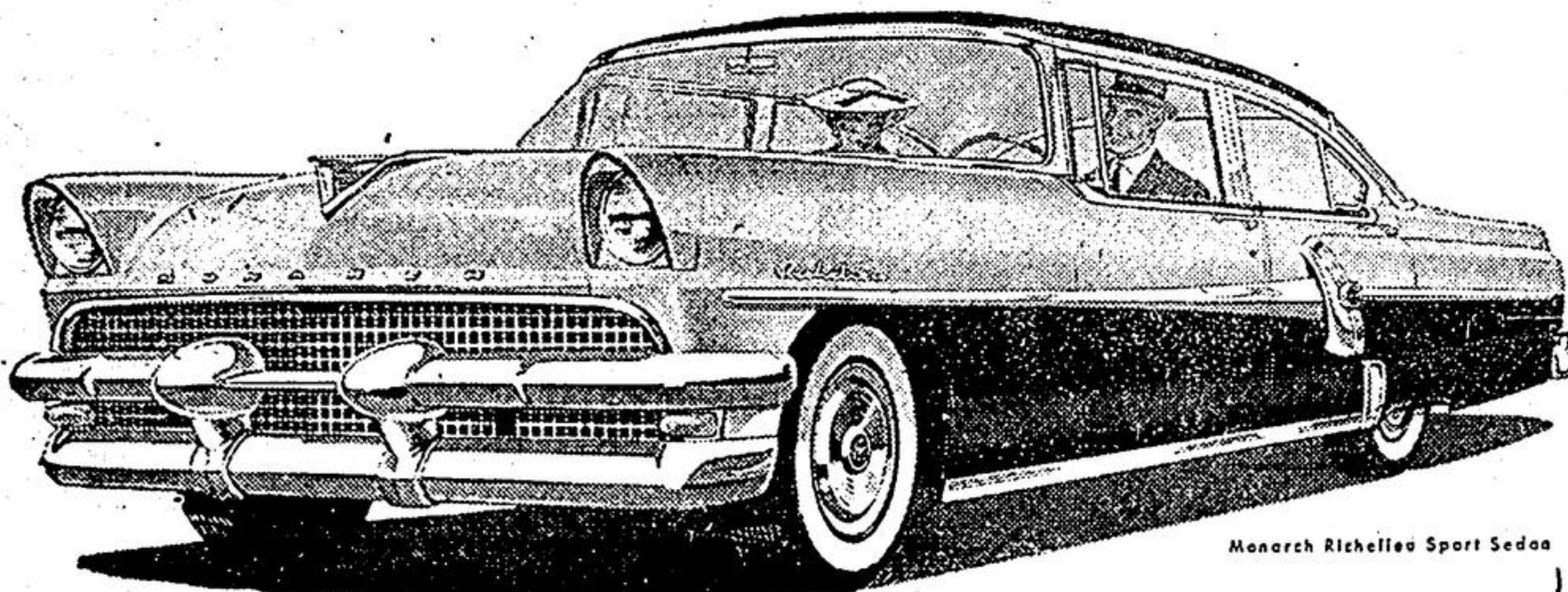
