Chart Showing Tiling Can Prove Invaluable

An important part of your farm records can be a map showing the location of all tile lines.

While the information may not be of much value to you as present owner, it will become of inestimable value to future owners of the farm.

Possibly you do not know the exact location of all tile drains and you may have to go out and locate the exact course. This may be accomplished with tile prods—long slender steel rods with stout handles—which may be pushed into most soil easily.

Soil Pushed Away
Old tile lines can be followed all the way across the farm with the tile prods. And many farmers will be shocked to find how shallow their tile lines are, especially where tile was laid years ago on slopes that erode badly.

In many sloping fields six to 12 inches of surface soil have been washed away within the past 20 years.

Once you start this job you might be surprised to find that your tile system isn't adequate. If so, notes of any faults should be made in your records.

Now, if you have progressed to the stage where you think you need new lines or repairs to old ones, observations of the contractor or of previous contractors will help make decisions and plan for improvement. Crops show the signs of poor drainage in wet seasons, but maps and records will help greatly.

It is very common for tiling machine crews to cut through old tile lines the owner never knew existed.

One of the queer stories about draining a farm pond comes from Illinois when a tiling machine cut through a big tile line laid years ago to drain that pond. But the survey showed that the tile ran uphill to get over a ridge, so of course it never worked. Never expect water to run uphill.

Determine Best Outlet
Surveyors laying new tile lines first determine the best possible outlet. Then they make sure there is proper grade or slope in the tile line so water will run.

One rule is to keep the tile at least 2 1/2 feet under the ground surface. But it may be necessary to place it much deeper in some spots to cut through a ridge to drain a pond.

The study of wet spots will usually reveal the cause — tile broken or poor outlets or a line that is not functioning because it was not laid correctly. Of course many wet spots never have been tiled out.

Sidehill seepage spots are common, and one goal of the tiler is to tap those spots, letting subsurface water run into the tile line before it seeps to the surface of the slope. Usually those sidehill seepage spots are found a fourth or a third of the way down from the top, depending on soil type and the area above.
