Name Pickering Man Prexy for Ontario PC's

The Progressive Conservative Association of the Federal Riding of Ontario, held their annual meeting in Whitby, Friday.

Dr. M. B. Dymond, former president of the Association, was elected to the Ontario Legislature at the last election, with the result that a new president had to be elected.

Mr. Alister Grosart, of Pickering, was elected president, with the rest of the executive practically unchanged. They are—Vice-presidents, Harry Jermy, Norman Down, Stuart McFarland and Mrs. Frank McCallum; Secty. Ernest Marks, Oshawa; treasurer E. Brownlee, Oshawa; auditors, Gordon Riehl and Tom Grosart, both of Oshawa. Honorary president, Russell Humphreys, QC, Oshawa, and past-president, Dr. M. B. Dymond, Port Perry.

Special speaker at the meeting was John B. Hamilton, MP, member for York West. Mr. Hamilton spoke of the simple, sincere aims of the party.

He said that the Conservatives are on the march, while the Liberal party is on the downgrade. To win Liberal seats, he said, the PC's will, however, have to win them seat by seat.

Although the aims of the Liberal party are nearer to those of the Conservative party than any of the others, he said, there is one big difference—the Conservatives believe above all that government should be by representation, not by Order in Council.

Mr. Hamilton concluded by expressing his confidence that the next Federal Government would be Conservative.

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TP. Elections
Rosebank Station, Cherry Tree, Ont., Pickering 2 Nov. 14, 1955

Editor, The Tribune
Dear Sir:

Again a year has passed and election time is upon us. During the past year Council has again failed to grasp its opportunities to plan, and execute such plans, to lead Pickering along a path toward a stable future with farmers, semi-urban residents and industry each playing their part to the same end—a united, prosperous and happy Township.

With ever increasing tax payments—whether from raised assessments or increases in tax rates makes no difference—the fact that more school accommodation is and will be needed and the reasonable demand that farmer and city worker alike are entitled to roads fit for all year travel makes further increases inevitable. It must be remembered that the more recently developed residential areas need water, sewage disposal, sidewalks and street lights at strategic points. With taxes at their present level we are paying—as individual owners—amounts comparable with city rates but with few of the everyday services provided. To what level our taxes may rise if these needed services are provided and residential building continues, is a frightening thought—and more than a thought—a terrifying prospect.

As a candidate for Reeve in the past, my three main points have been, firstly, the salvation of our Township and its taxpayers lay in increased industrial assessment—the accepted target figure being 40% of the total assessment of the Township—it is now little more than 1/2%; secondly, the utmost economy in spending and the assurance of 100 cents of value for each dollar spent; and thirdly, FORESIGHT.

Under present Council there has been no significant increase in industrial development—the most publicized "attempt" being the payment of \$500 per year as a grant to the Toronto Industrial Commission—whose interests, one suspects, are primarily Torontonians—without much material benefit. At Election Time we are apt to be told that one or more industries are

of the yearly tax collections and could be offset many times by the savings made by proper trained control.

My reason for writing at this time is the hope that, prior to Nomination Day, a new candidate for Reeve with the necessary qualifications for the post and adequate time to do more than has been done in the past, may come forward. In past elections others who considered running stepped aside, believing a change was necessary and not wishing to split the vote—possibly one of them may now come forward.

If I may, I would like to add three suggestions: first, realize the issues involved and stand united behind one candidate, making the election clear-cut—do not be misled into voting for "Men of Straw" who, without hope of election, may tend to split the vote. Second, vote for men for all offices whose primary interest is in the Township and not in using election to Municipal Office as a stepping stone. Third, NOTE.
