NO JUNIOR TEAM

It was with considerable surprise and regret that we learned early this week that Stouffville will not ice a Junior team here this season. The Red Wings faded out of the hockey picture with such suddenness that even the players themselves were surprised by the swift turn of events. A couple of weeks ago some twenty enthusiastic players turned out for practice — this week, these same lads were scattered between Unionville, Brooklin and Whitby, many not knowing whether they will be playing hockey at all this season. Some are enquiring about the formation of a Juvenile club but information concerning this setup is very vague. What is the reason for such a shake-up? There are two main reasons. The first — no sponsor; the second — lack of hockey talent. Everyone knows that nowadays it is almost impossible for an O.H.A. team to operate without a sponsor or financial backing from some source and I don't blame the management for being downhearted concerning the lack of funds. As far as a lack of playing talent is concerned, that's foolishness. The other night, Unionville played Brooklin and were shut out 6-0 but they didn't fold up. On Monday night, Whitby's Jr. "C" team entered Brooklin and they too were blanked 7-0 but they will continue to operate. Every team can't be a champion. Last season, Stouffville's Junior squad went into the playoffs, the underdogs but they knocked off Unionville and came very close to ousting Nobleton, who later went on to take the honors. To make the best with what you have is the main thing. Once a team folds up and the players are scattered to the four winds, it takes a lot of organizing to bring it back. Well, there's no use crying over spilt milk. What's done is done. It should be remembered that it is the Bantam, Midget, Juvenile and Junior teams that will supply future stars for our Intermediate roster. A chain is just as strong as its weakest link.

THE FIRST GAME

The Clippers have played and won their first game as ** O.H.A. Intermediate "A" entry. All in all, the team looked very good and they will undoubtedly improve as the schedule progresses. Considering the club had no exhibition games prior to Friday night's opener, they worked well as a unit although some of the boys looked a little shaky in the first period. Harold Hodgson, who has made the jump from Jr. "D" to Intermediate ranks was, on the night's performance, one of the best on the ice. He had more labelled shots on the net than any of his teammates; and was a definite scoring threat on every rush. The veteran Chick Webster playing between leftwinger Bud Lehman and Hodgson, kept pace with his younger wingers and set up two goal-mouth scoring plays. On the other line, Don Forgie was the driving force and his free skating style may make him one of the team's most potent penalty-killers. Bill Bradbury, although still out of condition, played a heads-up game. Polly Minton continues to be one of the fastest skaters on the squad in spite of being out of active participation in the game last season. Polly was out-lucked on three occasions on close-in chances. Jack Watson, one of the team's veterans has not hit his mid-season form. He was the top goal scorer with Markham last year. The four defencemen, Don McIntosh, Les Clarke, Jack Snell and Ronnie Bell gave goaltender Norm Stunden plenty of protection. In the second and third periods, the agile Clipper netminder had very little to do.

Another season of hockey has started. From a first glimpse it would appear that the opposition is going to be strong. Two or three weeks will tell how our local entry will stack up in this new class.

FOUR SCORE AND FORTY

This season more than 120 boys between the ages of 8 and 13 years have registered to play in the Lions' PeeWee Hockey League. This is without a doubt the largest number of young lads ever to play in this group. In the next couple of weeks a few more will probably be added. As one onlooker stated as he looked through the maze of skates, pads and hockey sticks that patrolled the ice on Monday night, "I never knew there were so many kids around this district." When the PeeWee Program was shifted from Saturday afternoon to Monday night some believed (including myself) that the attendance would drop. This however has not been the case, rather it would seem the change has brought an increase not only in the number of young lads but also in the number of parents. The parents have been most co-operative in securing birth certificates for their young sons and in arranging shift transportation to and from the arena. With some of the teams having more than twenty boys on their roster, the majority of these being eight and nine years old, some of these younger chaps may feel they don't get enough time out on the ice. This is probably true and it is hoped more time may be made available.

Clippers Beat Oakville 4-2 To Open Schedule, A Pleasing Performance

A hard-fighting Stouffville Clipper club opened the Intermediate "A" hockey season here on Friday night by posting a 4-2 victory over Oakville Meteors. The homesters spotted the visitors one goal early in the first period but rallied to deadlock the count before the whistle. The Clippers took a 3-1 lead in the 2nd frame and each team tallied once in the last period. Coach Bob Bangay started veteran Chick Webster at centre ice between wingers Harold Hodgson and Bud Lehman. This threesome notched two of their team's four tallies. Another line comprised Don Forgie at centre with Howard Bullock and Ken Crawford on the wings. Polly Minton worked between Bill Bradbury and Jack Watson. Don McIntosh, Les Clarke, Jack Snell and Ronnie Bell formed the defensive units. The Clippers, playing their first organized game, appeared to be somewhat disorganized in the opening minutes and Oakville took advantage of a break to notch their first goal after less than two minutes of play. Bob Patterson, by far Oakville's best, lobbed a shot past goalie Norm Stunden at 1:21. At 9:16 Ken Crawford blazed a hard drive through the pads of Oakville netminder Murray Lanneval to put both teams on even terms. Don Forgie and Ronnie Bell picked up assists on the play. The Forgie, Bullock, Crawford line, which appeared to be lost in the opening 20 minutes, bore into the attack in the second period and carried the play into the Oakville end. At 10:42, Ken Crawford slid the puck back to defenceman Jack Snell and he promptly blinked the light with a low shot. Stouffville continued to carry the play throughout the period and at 17:31 Harold Hodgson, playing his best game of his career, scored on passes from linemates Chick Webster and Bud Lehman. Each club tallied once in the last period. Hardly had the puck been dropped when leftwinger Bud Lehman put the Clippers three goals up with an assist going to Chick Webster, defenceman Don McIntosh serving a penalty. Harrold parked the puck behind Stunden for the final goal of the game. There were seventeen penalties, ten to Stouffville and seven to Oakville. The Oakville squad, although very fast, lacked the conditioning of the Clippers and faded badly in the second and third periods. Stouffville carried the play to the Meteors in the latter stages of the contest and would have increased their total but for lack of polish around the net. Polly Minton came within an ace of notching his first goal of the young season when he bounced a bullet drive off the goal post. On the game, Harold Hodgson, Don Forgie and Don McIntosh looked good. Junior O.H.A. Team Forced to Fold Up, No Sponsor, No Players

The Stouffville Red Wings local Junior "D" entry will not operate this season. The club that worked its way into the group finals last winter and came very close to knocking off the powerful Nobleton squad, has decided to disband. The management gave three main reasons for their decision — no sponsor, lack of players and poor grouping. Manager Len Buckland stated that although a number of local sports promoters had promised financial assistance to the entry, the response wasn't great enough to see the team through for an entire season. Coach Polly Minton, who was working hard in an effort to ice a contending squad was struck a hard blow when Unionville demanded the use of Stouffville netminder, Bruce Middleton. Harold Hodgson's decision to play in Intermediate "A" ranks also weakened the team's chances. The management was confident of obtaining the services of former Unionville centre star, Bruce McDowell, but a protest would have to be made to the O.H.A. and the management declined to take such steps. The club's expenses were to be further increased due to the team being placed in a group with Orangeville and the management was not in favor of the long-distance travelling. The local entry had a number of fine performers including Don Haynes, Don Tran, Frank Hendy, Grant Wagg, Jim Rennie, Dave Hammersley, Jack Pollard, Don Jackson and Steve Wideman. A number of these players are expected to line up with Unionville. Some have already played with Whitby, in Junior "C" company.
