High School Commencement

The President of the Student Body pointed out that the two main aims of the High School were to provide the students with a basic education and also provide other forms of extra-curricular activities.

Mr. O. E. Robbins, Principal of the Stouffville District High School, in his remarks offered congratulations to the Honor Graduates. He expressed considerable concern however, that the percentage of students who completed Grade 13 should be so small as compared to the number who entered Grade 9 from Public School. Mr. Robbins pointed out that the staff could not hope for perfection but they would like to attain a higher standard. Principal Robbins stressed the need for parent interest and co-operation both with the students and with the staff.

"Many parents are inclined to blame the teachers for a student's lack of success but too often the fault lies with the student himself," said Mr. Robbins. He pointed out also that in many cases, television and sports were allowed to interfere too much with a student's curricular work. Mr. Robbins introduced the staff members to the audience.

Mr. Allen Stouffer delivered the Valedictory Address. He paid tribute to the staff teachers who through times of discouragement and despair, were quick to remind students that "things worth having are worth working for." He said that he considered it a privilege to attend High School when so many were unable to do so. He also considered himself very fortunate to be a member of the first graduating class to emerge from the new High School building.

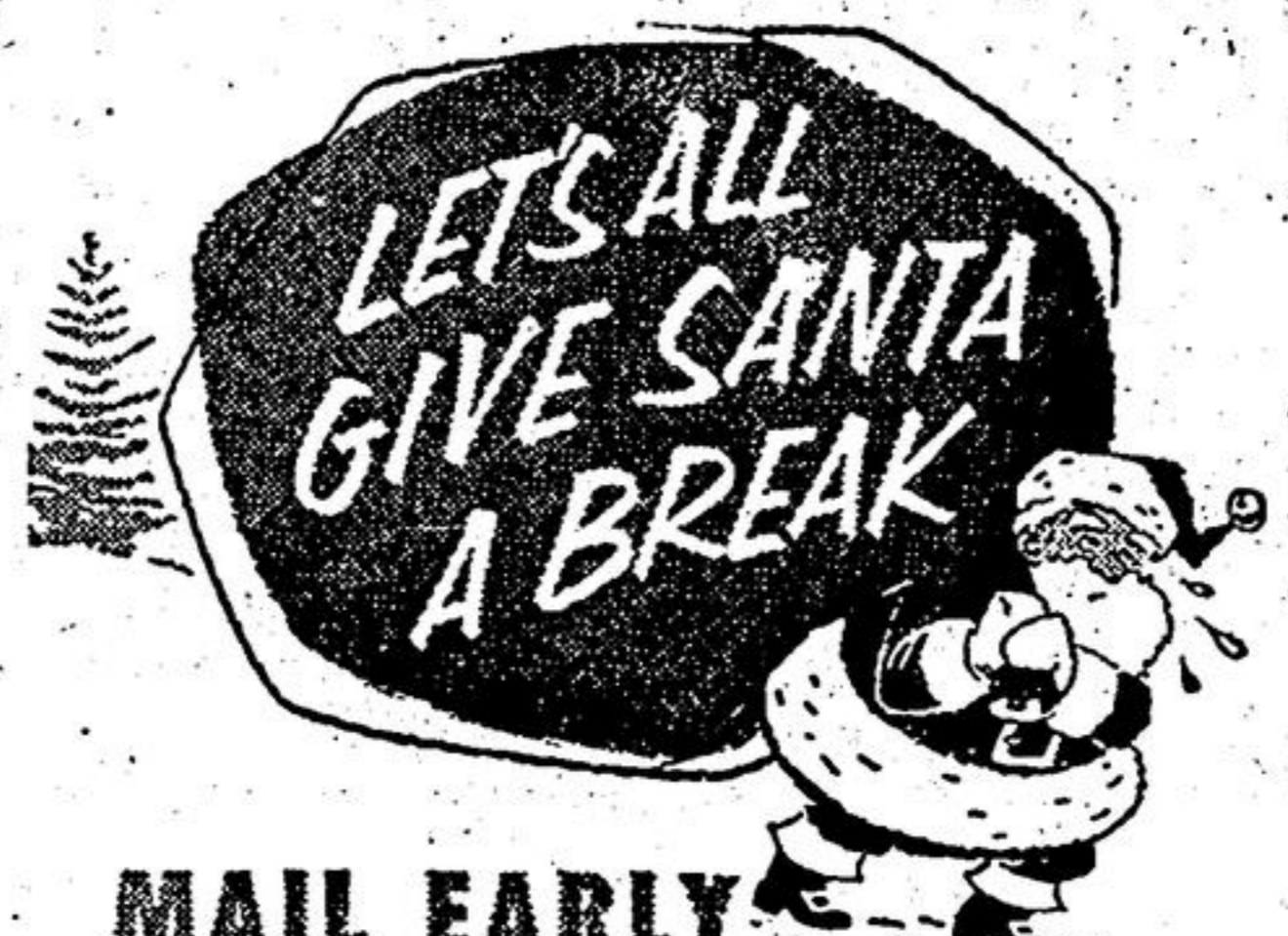
