

Recover Stolen Car After Rash of Breakins Here Tuesday Night

Burglars broke into three of the business premises here in the early hours of Wednesday morning, making off with a new car from Les. Wilson Motors at the west end of town. Prompt action of police resulted in recovery of the car before noon of the same day. It was found abandoned in Long Branch, and was returned to Wilson Motors.

Believed to be the work of the same group, the other entries were made at the Schell Lumber Ltd., and the Arena Building. While no money was believed stolen from the lumber yard, a quantity of cigar-

ettes and a small amount of money was reported stolen from the booth in the arena.

Constable W.S. Hillard of the local provincial police investigated the series of break-ins, and the prompt relaying of the news to other police forces resulted in the quick identification of the stolen car. No yet licensed for the road, the stolen car was still covered with "In Transit" stickers. These were removed by the thieves, who also removed the licence plates from another car in the Wilson garage, and placed them on the car before driving it away.
