Clippers Drop See-Saw Overtime Game to Oakville by 7-5 Score

Stouffville Clippers dropped a see-saw overtime contest to Oakville on Friday night by a score of 7-5. The game was a hectic affair that saw four goals scored in the ten minutes overtime session. Both clubs were deadlocked at 4-4 at the end of regulation time. Oakville notched the first goal in overtime but the Clippers rallied to pull back on even terms. With time running out, the Meteors took advantage of a Stouffville penalty and pulled their goaltender. Playing six men to five inside the Clipper blue line, the winners beat Stunden with what proved to

be the winner. Coach Bob Bangay in attempting to pull the game out of the fire, took goalie Stunden from the cage but the move backfired and Oakville fired the puck down the ice into the empty net. Norm Stunden played a fine game in the nets for the Clippers in spite of the setback. The defence looked weaker than usual and were caught out of position on a number of occasions. fowl spirochetosis and encephalitis which is carried from fowl to man by mosquitoes. Control of poultry mites has been troublesome in the past, but since the introduction of malathion, getting rid of these barely visible parasites has become relatively simple. Mr. Mumby says. Tests have shown that four percent malathion dust applied thoroughly to the roosts, nests and floor litter at the rate of one pound to each 20 square feet of floor space has been found highly effective in ridding birds of both mite species. The dust can be easily applied by use of a hand rotary or puff duster and one application lasts for weeks. Test indicated that feeding birds with the insecticide in their daily ration in excess of any amount they could pick up from the litter showed no effects whatsoever on them, stated Mr. Mumby, thus indicating that malathion is safe to use in poultry mite control.

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
