



**FATAL PENALTIES**  
The old adage, "You can't score goals in the penalty box" was brought home to the Stouffville Clippers on Tuesday night. The ten penalties handed out to the local squad (including a major and two 10 minute misconducts) in the first and second periods allowed the visiting Georgetown Raiders to roll to a rather easy 5-1 victory. The numerous trips to the cooler for the Clippers early in the game was even more serious since, Stouffville were trailing their rivals at the time. The lack of forward line strength fouled up their offensive attack and put more strain on their over-worked rearwards. The majority of penalties handed out were of the ridiculous type and a couple of players heaped more trouble on themselves and their teammates by arguing the official's ruling too strenuously, hence an extra ten minutes was added. In the third period the story was much different. The Clippers were penalized only once and they held 75% of the territorial play. At the end of this month, Stouffville will lose one of its most ardent sports promoters in Constable W. S. "Casey" Hilliard. The local Police Chief has been one of the main organizers of sport here during the past couple of years and his services will certainly be missed.

Constable Hilliard has been a very enthusiastic worker with the young boys both in town and surrounding district. Following his arrival here he stepped in and took over one of the PeeWee teams in the Lions League and last winter he coached his team to the runner-up position in the group. Following the wind-up of the league he treated his team and other local sports promoters to a turkey supper at his home.

Working through the Police Association, "Casey" put two fine trophies for competition last year. The midget award went to Brooklin while the Bantam silverware was retained by the local entry. This year he obtained no less than eight trophies, six for the PeeWees and one each for the Bantams and Midgets. Only recently he, along with other Stouffville men, represented our minor hockey teams at the annual meeting of the O.M.H.A. in Toronto. Last winter he aided in the organization of the Midget team and this year he was appointed manager of the club. He arranged to have the team provided with new uniforms, through the generosity of Keyson Motors. The organization of a Safety Club has made dozens of boys and girls safety conscious. Last winter the first "old-timers" game was organized and "Casey" was a member of that team. When any of the coaches of local clubs are unable to attend, Const. Hilliard is always quick to fill in where needed. Only recently he put the Bantam team through a vigorous practice session when coach Nick Bangay was unable to attend through sickness. He is now working on the possibility of icing a Juvenile club and it is very likely that he will succeed.

These are only a few highlights of Constable "Casey" Hilliard's busy sports life since coming to Stouffville. During his off-hours it is a familiar sight to see him down at the arena in the winter or at the ball park in the summer. Sports promoters and organizers like Constable "Casey" Hilliard are very few in towns like Stouffville. Speaking on behalf of the hundreds of young folk he has worked with and trained in both sports and other activities, I know that his efforts have been very much appreciated.

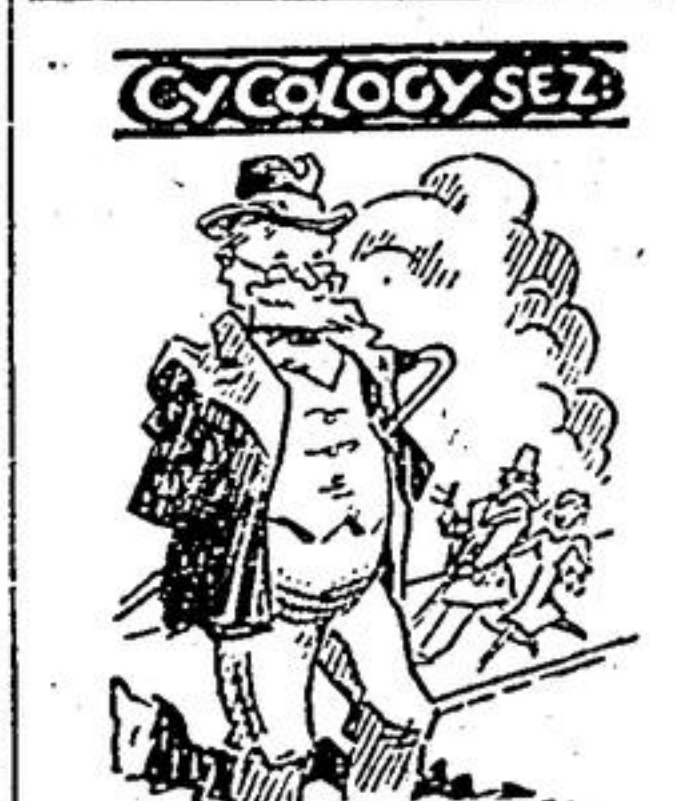

## Georgetown Piles Up Early Lead To Beat Clippers by 5-1 Score

For two periods on Tuesday night, the Stouffville Clippers looked like a team that had turned out for the season's initial practice session. The entire squad was totally disorganized. Wild passing, erratic shooting and a host of ridiculous penalties allowed the visiting Georgetown Raiders to pile up a commanding 5-0 lead and go to win the contest quite handsily 5-1.

For the greater part of the last twenty minutes of play, Stouffville forced the attack into the Raiders' end of the rink but time ran out with the visitors still hanging onto their four goal advantage. Andy Closs potted the lone Clipper tally on a goal-mouth pass from rightwinger Archie Forfar. Jerry Ingles notched two goals for the winners with Bill Chard, Jack Beaumont and Ron Dixon firing singles.

At the end of the second frame, tempers were near the breaking point. The ill feeling spread into the stands and a near-brawl broke out close to the Stouffville players' box.
