

PATAL PENALTIES

The old adage, "You can't score goals in the penalty box" was brought home to the Stouffville Clippers on Tuesday night. The ten penalties handed out to the local squad (including a major and two 10 minute misconducts) in the first and second periods allowed the visiting Georgetown Raiders to roll to a rather easy 5-1 victory. The numerous trips to the cooler for the Clippers early in the game was even more serious since, Stouffville were trailing their rivals at the time. The lack of forward line strength fouled up their offensive attack and put more strain of their over-worked rearguards.
