William Scott, who heads the public relations personnel branch of Dominion Electrohome Industries, Ltd suggested that modern food packaging methods have contributed to widening the gap. His reasoning was thus: The

city housewife goes to the supermarket and picks up a wax carton of milk, a can of meat sauce, a box of paper-linked wieners, a can of cooked chicken, a can of gravy, a carton of eggs, a tin of apple sauce. cellophane-wrapped steak and a box of processed cheese. There is no direct association with the farmer-salesman-producer anymore. On her tour down the next aisle of the store she may pick up similar fancy packages in which are corn syrup, margarine, catsup, soap flakés, floor wax, soda biscuits direct association with the farm yet they are in the same type of packages. She doesn't shop for food anymore; she shops for the brightest colored pack-

wants to go back to the old days when the farmer and his wife made Saturday door-todoor canvasses with eggs, meat apples, cream and chickens. Almost gone is the day when the housewife can go into a store and see hung sides of beef and pork, a counter full of chickens. a crate of eggs, bins of potatoes and apples fresh from the farm. Not having this direct contact with the farmer a housewife never gets a chance to discuss the farmer's problems with him: That there are plenty of bargain-price apples this year, hogs are selling cheap because the western farmer has expanded production, eggs are high because many went out of chickens last year, and that his manure spreader cost \$200

Somehow the farmers must find the means to get their story over to their city cousins, said Mr. Scott. They must choose dramatic ways. We pointed out, as an example, \$13.45 that the Dairy Farmers of Canada had an advertising Washington 25.50 hudget of \$365,000 to advertise dairy products nationally. He said, "I've never seen any of that advertising." Dozens of other people have said: the same thing. Possible reasons could be that his budget is spread too thin for adequate nationwide coverage and that it should be increased. Then again, the ads could be too "arty" and lack the dramatic punch needed to "hit" the aver-
