R. A. BOVAIR BURIED AT VIC. SQ.

The Gormley community was shocked by the sudden passing with a heart attack of Roy Alexander Bovair on Thursday afternoon, January 18, while driving his car in North Toronto.

Mr. Bovair, son of the late Charles and Anne Bovair, was born in North Toronto and lived there until April 1933 when he with his family moved to this community. He attended Davisville School when a boy.

He has suffered heart seizures for the last ten years and worked as a part-time mechanic until last June, when he was severely burned while moving a can of gasoline which was beside a torch that was in use at the time.

Left to mourn his passing are his wife, the former Emma Ratke; two daughters, Mrs. Lawrence Boynton (Audrey) and Mrs. Clem Elias (Betty) and a granddaughter, Debra Lynne Elias. A sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Bovair, who lived in Midland, died of a heart attack on Friday morning while dressing to come to her brother's funeral.

The service was conducted by Rev. C. E. Hunking and Rev. A. C. Huston in Wright and Taylor's Funeral Home, Richmond Hill. Interment was in Victoria Square Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Messrs Elmer, Arthur and Max Ratke, Adolfe Winsell, Jack Watson and Bill Burnett.

Plans for a medical library at Peekskill Hospital in memory of Dr. Fred Brillinger, Stouffville son, were announced last week in the Peekskill Evening Star. The memorial project is being organized by a committee of friends and former patients of the doctor.

Dr. Fred Brillinger whose passing was announced in an earlier issue of The Tribune, had been a practising physician in Peekskill, N.Y. for almost 28 years. He was 54 years old.

He had recently completed a term as president of the medical staff at the local hospital in Peekskill.

Born in Stouffville September 19, 1901, he grew up here as a lad and graduated from the University of Toronto in 1925.

He interned at Grasslands Hospital, N.Y., and during the latter two years of his three years there, he was in charge of pediatrics for the Department of Child Welfare, White Plains.

His long practice was interrupted only by his United States Army service, where he held the rank of Colonel.

He was a member of The Kappa Psi, a medical fraternity and was a member and former elder in the Peekskill Presbyterian Church. In his limited leisure he was an active gardener, but for the most part his was a busy working life.

His survivors include his wife, a son and daughter, three brothers, Walter, Harry and Percy Brillinger and a sister, Mrs. Bert Miller, of Stouffville.
