Dr. Ernst Stuhlinger, German physicist and jet propulsion expert at the U.S. Army Guided Missiles Centre, Huntsville, Ala., envisages a cosmic "butterfly" measuring 1,500 feet across to carry man into outer space.

We wonder what attention has been given to the problem of getting back to earth again.

**Ontario Plowmen Plan Active Year in 1956**

The 46th annual meeting of the Ontario Plowman's Association was held in the King Edward Hotel this week. An interesting program was enjoyed by delegates from the different branch matches throughout the Province, and many visitors interested in agriculture.

Among those in attendance from the North York branch of the Ont. Plowmen's Association were Mr. and Mrs. Ivan McLaughlin who gave an illustrated address of their trip to Sweden for the World Plowing Match. R. C. Baycroft is president of the Association; Sec-Treas., Mr. and Mrs. Win Timbers, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Simpson and Bob Timbers acted on a panel discussion on improving plowing matches.

A great deal of interest is being shown in this section due to the International Match being held in Ontario County in 1956 on the Farm of Heber Down, Brooklin, when the Ontario and Canadian Championships will be decided.

**NEW SYSTEM OF JUDGING**

W. P. Watson, Ontario Live Stock Commissioner, announced today that 283 bulls have been entered in this year's Ontario Bull Sale which will be held at the Sheep and Swine Arena, Royal Winter Fair Building, on March 7 and 8. The entries represent 133 Ontario breeders located between Kent County on the west and Renfrew on the east. Entered in the sale are 111 Shorthorns, 123 Herefords and 49 Aberdeen Angus.

This year's sale which is sponsored by the Ontario Beef Cattle Improvement Ass'n, is expected to set a new high in the quality of animals offered. Herefords and Aberdeen Angus will be offered for sale on Wednesday, March 7, with the Shorthorns selling on Thursday, March 8.

All animals entered in the sale must be shown on the evening prior to the day the breed to which it belongs is scheduled to be sold.

Mr. Watson states that a new system of judging is to be tried this year. There will be an official judge for each breed and the three men appointed to these positions will constitute the culling committee. Each man will be required to indicate on a card the bulls which in his opinion are not suitable for use as sires. If only one judge considers that a bull should be rejected, it will be eligible for the sale. If two judges register rejections, the bull will not be allowed to pass through the sale, but the owner will be permitted to take it home. However, if all judges register rejections, the bull becomes the property of the sponsor.

**Meet to Talk Annexation**

Uxbridge Township will hold a special meeting to discuss the recently proposed annexation plans now under consideration by Uxbridge Township. Reeve Stuart Ball of the township stated that he didn't want to stand in the way of progress but he felt their municipality couldn't afford to lose the assessment. Altogether three separate plans have been brought forward by the town.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

**Raisin Jumbles**  
 (Makes 40 cookies)

1 cup butter or shortening  
 1 cup sugar  
 1 egg  
 1/4 cup flour  
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 cup chopped seeded raisins  
 1/2 cup citron  
 1/2 cup almonds.

Cream together sugar and butter. Add beaten egg and cream until fluffy. Sift together flour and nutmeg and add to butter mixture, beating thoroughly. Add flavoring, fruit and almonds. Drop by spoonfuls on greased baking sheet and bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven for 15 minutes or until golden brown.

the collar to prevent the shirt from crushing when it's in the drawer. Sheets which have worn-out in the middle need not be discarded. Use them for sewing on a mattress pad and you'll be able to tuck the sheet part in and thus prevent the pad from slipping.

Plastic spoons are ideal for supporting plants and vines which are in flower pots. They do not rot and can be moved easily since soil does not cling to them.

**Support Rural Safety Week**

"The Ontario Federation of Agriculture is sponsoring a Rural Safe Driving Week, February 20th to 25th, 1956," Attorney General Kelso Roberts announced today. "Each of the County Federations of Agriculture are co-operating and will be holding meetings during that week at which representatives of the Ontario Provincial Police will be present and will participate. This constitutes

the type of co-operation in the safety drive which is so essential if the problem is to be solved on anything approaching a satisfactory basis," Mr. Roberts commented.

The Attorney General said that the O.F.A.'s drive was a part of the province's safety campaign which has been termed "Operation Live".

"The people of the Province of Ontario must endorse and

support all the time this continuing drive to assure success in road safety," the Attorney General said. "It is all the more important because every one of us has a personal interest in seeing it succeed — any one of us may suffer irreparable personal injuries or even death by failing to give that support and in our daily actions conforming to the requirements for safety on the highways."

**ISRAEL'S 'BOYS TOWN'**

BECAUSE four out of five Israeli teen-agers receive no high school training, a group of American educators established a "Boys Town" in Jerusalem in 1949. Today, the school is giving bright boys a tuition-free education that includes religious studies and technical training. Each class has to spend one period a day on "4-H Club" duty. Cleanliness is emphasized in daily inspections of their living quarters. The boys are given merit points for cleanest rooms. After their classes are over, they turn to many varied forms of recreation. They will be among Israel's future leaders.
