**WHAT, NO CRITICISM?**  
 In scanning over the innumerable reports that followed Russia's hockey victory over Canada in the recent Olympics, it was very interesting to note that the Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen received very little criticism for their rather mediocre showing at Cortina, Italy and even the CAHA was not criticised to any extent for sending such a hockey representative over to Europe to retain the honours won by Pentecost V's. I, for one do not wish to find fault with either the Kitchener team or the CAHA but when I recall the banner headlines of criticism heaped on the Toronto Lyndhursts two years ago when they lost out to the Russians it would seem rather queer that the daily sports writers have suddenly buried their heads and have made no special point of "blasting" the Dutchies for their setback. It is true that Lyndhurst Motors lost to Russia by a 7-2 score but at least they managed to tally one goal while Kitchener was held completely off the score sheet. In addition, the Toronto team suffered only one loss, that to Russia, while the Dutchmen dropped an additional game to the United States entry and were fighting with their backs to the wall from then until the crucial contest on Saturday. In fact, if the truth is known, Kitchener's entire Olympic hockey performance could not be classed as representative of Canada's so-called "hockey supremacy." Even against some of the weaker European clubs, Kitchener had to go all-out to win. One can hardly blame Lyndhurst's manager, Greg Currie, for turning on his assailants and throwing back some of the charges that were directed at his club in 1954. Lyndhursts at that time were playing in Senior "B" class hockey and this in itself brought down the wrath of the sports writers on the heads of the CAHA, and on Greg Currie and Co. From watching the game on TV it would appear that the Senior "A" representative wasn't much of an improvement over the Senior "B" entry two years ago. It was interesting to note that forward Jack McKenzie was selected as the top front line performer in the tournament but his goal scoring total was short of the record set by Lyndhurst's Moe Galand. Perhaps in the future, some of these fiery writers should think before they speak or they'll be forced to once again hide their heads.
