Suburban High School Teachers At Conference

On Thursday, February 23, about 1200 suburban Toronto Secondary School teachers will take time off from their classrooms to attend a regional educational conference. Under the direction of District 8 of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, the conference is self-sponsored and organized by teachers. Each teacher in the area will study the topic of his choice presented for discussion at one of five schools.

At Earl Haig Collegiate, teachers may hear an address by Dr. C. E. Phillips of Ontario College of Education on the topic: "Standards in Education." After the address, the teachers will discuss their own views on the subject in groups of twenty under the direction of specially prepared leaders. At Western Collegiate, teachers will hear contrary points of view on the topic: "Good classroom and school discipline" in addresses to be given by J. H. R. Morgan, Superintendent of Secondary Schools for Toronto; and V. Trost, Director of Guidance, Forest Hill Village Schools. Also, teachers will see typical problems in discipline illustrated by a film. At Forest Hill Collegiate, W. J. McCordic, Executive Secretary of the Metropolitan Board of Education; R. H. King, Director of Education, Twp. of Scarborough; and L. G. Cheliew, Principal of the Forest Hill Junior High School will present a symposium on "The Intermediate School." Also at Forest Hill Collegiate, Dr. K. S. Bernhardt, Professor of Psychology, University of Toronto, will speak on the topic: "Responsibility Among Secondary School Students." At Downsview Collegiate a panel discussion on "The Role of Extra-Curricular Activities" will be led by chairman R. J. Coulter, Director of Extension, University of Toronto. The panel will be composed of a parent, a teacher, a student, and a principal. At Leaside High School, teachers will break up into discussion groups after hearing an address by Dr. S. R. Laycock on the topic: "The needs of the Adolescent." Members of boards of education and their officials have been invited to attend.
