CALFHOOD VACC. COMPULSORY

The Calfhood Vaccination committees appointed by the townships of King, Whitchurch and Georgina, under the Brucellosis Control Act met in the office of the Department of Agriculture, Newmarket, together with the inspectors, on Monday afternoon when Dr. Warton, Provincial Veterinarian, explained to the committees and their inspectors, the procedure to be followed in listing the calves in their townships for vaccination. Commencing on March 1st, farmers will be obliged to make available for vaccination, all heifer calves 6, 7 and 8 months of age.

Aid Asked By Local Pastor In His Work

Dear Friends,
Usually our letters come to you indirectly through individuals, church groups or the Board of Information and Stewardship. We are very grateful for this kind service and you will be hearing from us regularly in the future. We hope. But this is a special request letter and it comes directly and we hope speedily right from our dining room table to your door. We wish we could address and stamp ourselves and come in person.

Included in this special request is the ever present call for prayer and the Guidance of the Lord. There are many instances which have worked out in such a way that truly we can say "this is because people are praying". So when you consider this special request, we are going to ask, and you may find it difficult to do anything, please consider that it is still a special request letter for prayer.

Before we mention the special request try to picture if you can, a group of live and spirited children around a teacher and she has nothing but words to teach them. I think you would say that before long that girl will throw up her hands and say she just wasn't cut out to be a teacher. Our Japanese Christian workers have the patience of Job and are most loyal to The Cause, but they could greatly increase their effectiveness if they just had some teaching aids.

At a recent meeting of the pastors the idea of having some

sort of audio-visual aid distributing centre was discussed and thoroughly approved. This new department will start functioning in April. It was hoped that something like an audio-visual lending library could be started. This will be a conveniently located place where pastors and young people can drop in and pick up what supplies they need returning at the same time what they have already used. As far as possible it will be entirely free of charge to the individual. The churches hope to receive the needed equipment through voluntary gifts. The desire to ask us to serve on this lending library committee has been expressed.

It has occurred to us that HERE IS THE SPOT where we can answer the request that has come in many letters from home — "Is there any little thing I can do to help you or send to you?" Yes, here is something that is urgently needed right now. For those who are leaders of groups or classes and you would like a project, may I suggest you take your pick of the following and send it to us at:

1. Flannelgraph sets, for instance Joseph, Noah, Abram, Samuel, David, Gideon, the life of Jesus, Paul, Stephen etc., about \$1.50 each.
2. Film strips of the same or any Bible story.
3. Coloured slides.
4. "Visualette" Books.
5. Pieces of solid plain coloured (not white or flowery) flannelette cloth about a yard

square. About 50¢ a yard. (Backs for flannelgraph sets) 6. Puppet (paper cardboard) figures or sets telling Bible stories.

7. Chalk talk books and chalk (this must be the very soft kind about one inch square and two inches long, sticks in a variety of colours).

None of the above can be procured in Japan; we would therefore like the goods rather than money. However, this lending library will need slide projectors including film strip adjustments and tape recorders. I hesitate to ask you to send them unless you can prevail on someone to bring them. However, projectors and tape recorders are available in Japan and it might be the wiser plan to send money. If you have or can get used machines these would come through official barriers with little trouble. Any of the things included in the first seven could be sent 'sample post' at a great reduction in postage. We realize that projectors and tape recorders are big things to ask for and you may not be able to do anything about them. However, you know that we need them and therefore can join in prayer that they will be supplied in God's own time and way.

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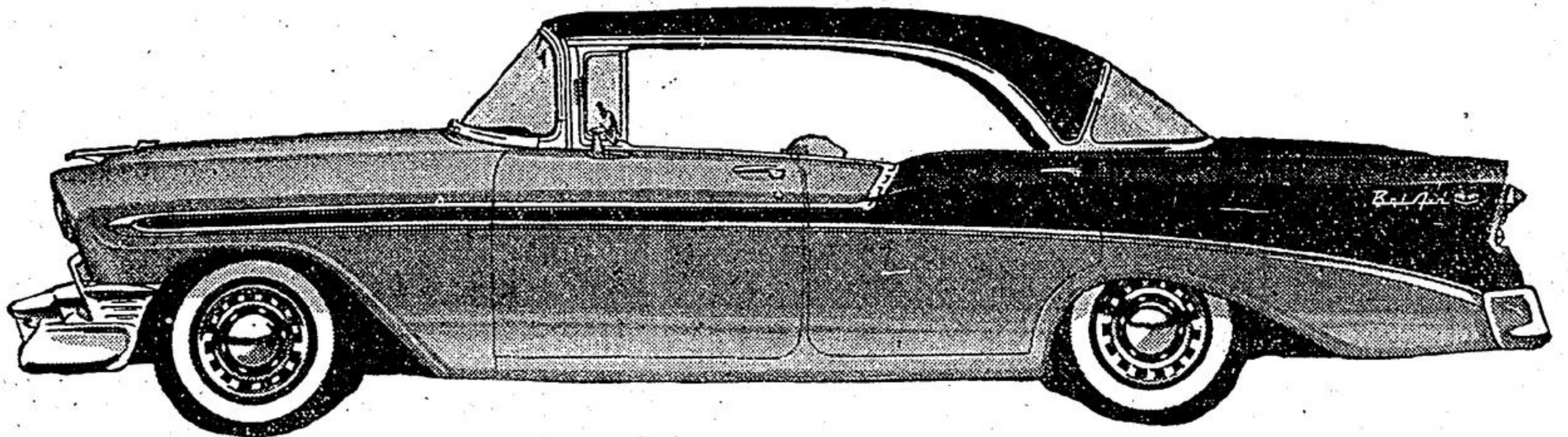

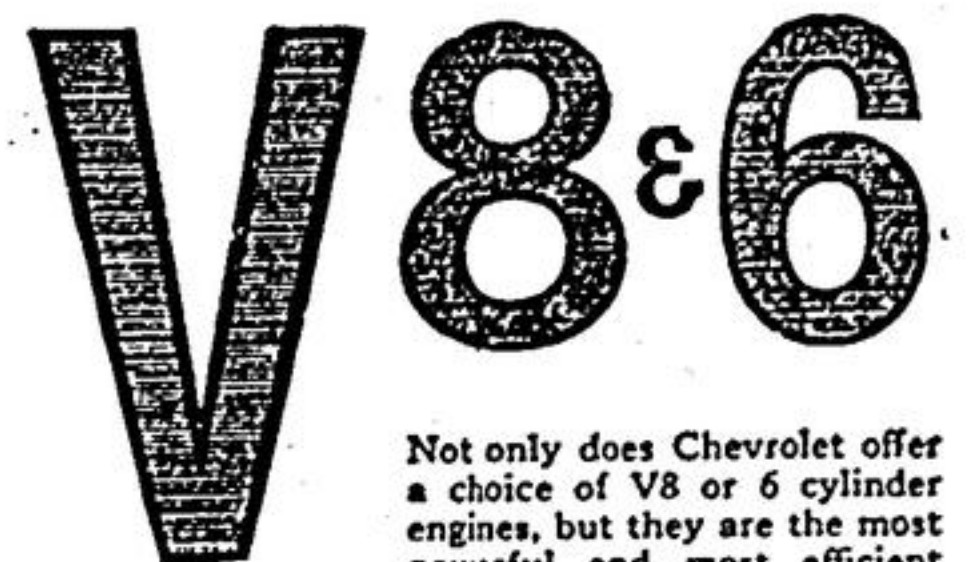
