This problem of training new staff was appreciated this week by the council, who voted to boost Mr. Hoover's pay to the sum of \$1,200 for the year 1956. At the same meeting, the pay of the Township Engineer, K. Ross Simmons, was set at \$3,200. Small increases in salary were given the hourly-rated employees of the road department, who were awarded pay hikes of 5 cents per hour. These rates are retroactive to the first of the year. Also singled out for pay increases were the stock keeper and road foreman, whose pay boost amounted to \$200 per annum.

Province OK's Boost in Twp. Road Spending

It was learned at Markham Township Council this week that the provincial approval for road appropriation this year will be in the amount of \$153,000. This is an increase of \$5,000 over the amount for last year. This sum is subject to a subsidy from the Ontario government of fifty percent of normal expenditures for maintenance and road construction. The breakdown authorizes the expenditure of \$125,000 for maintenance of township roads and \$30,000 for construction.
