

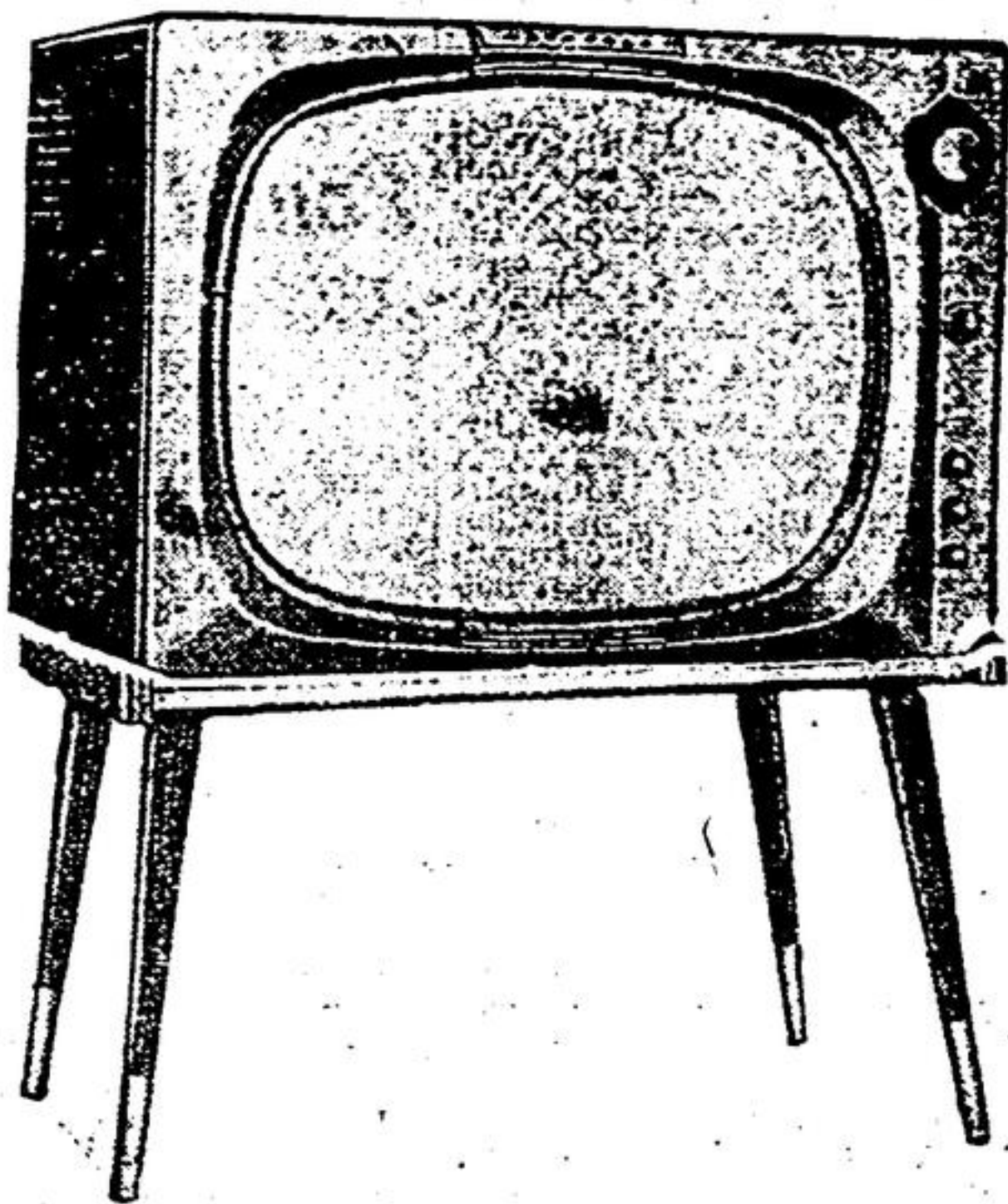

(Continued from page 1) spent many hours reading her favorite scriptures and hymns. When she could no longer read, it was a source of comfort to her to be able to quote by memory many of the verses which meant so much to her. During the three years and five months she was confined to her bed she was tenderly cared for by two of her daughters, Clara at home, and Annie who had spent thirty years as a missionary in India, and was happy to be with her mother the past four years.

Mrs. Steckley was the youngest of seven children born to the late Christopher Heise of Victoria Square. In 1886 she was married to the late Joseph Steckley of Whitchurch Township. They settled on the sixth concession, on the farm now owned by Mr. George Yake. In 1919 they moved to Gormley. Mr. Steckley predeceased her in 1931.

One brother, Levi Heise, in his 93rd year, now lives at Fort Erie. Also surviving are her six daughters, and four sons — Mrs. Alvin Winger, Mrs. Roy Wideman, Clarence, Levi, Mrs. Roy Brillinger, Annie and Clara, in the home community; Elmer of Ft. Erie, Waller of Barrie, and Mrs. Geo. Sheffer of Stayner. There are thirty-eight grandchildren and thirty-six great grand children. Pallbearers were six grandsons — Mervyn Wideman, Walter Brillinger, Bruce Steckley, Carl Steckley, Alvin Steckley and Howard Steckley.
