## Whitchurch Dogs Must All Be Tagged by May 1

Whitchurch Twp. council on Thursday evening agreed that the municipality should be posted advising residents that all dogs must be tied and tags procured not later than May 1st. The step is in keeping with the municipality's responsibility in the matter of public health due to the recent threat of rabies. Deputy Reeve Richardson stated that he didn't see why the assessor should have to make repeated trips to some ratepayers to collect their dog tax and said that he favoured these delinquents being summoned if they failed to pay by the deadline.

**Favor More Pension**  
 Whitchurch Township Council has gone on record as favoring a resolution prepared by New Toronto requesting the federal government to increase old age pensions from \$40 to \$65. A copy of the resolution is being forwarded to Prime Minister St. Laurent and Health Minister Paul Martin.

**Conservation**  
 Payments were made Thursday night to the Rouge River Cons. Authority of \$238.36 as the Whitchurch share of their 1956 budget and to the Upper Holland Authority \$260.85 as the current share of the northern effort.

Relief accounts passed for payment amounted to \$789.47. Other routine business included the approval of the annual contract with the Provincial Police to patrol the two lake areas of the township during the summer months.

 and West Blocks of the Parliament Journal a few days ago, the Government has decided to fly the Red Ensign on the East main Buildings the year around. The Red Ensign, the official flag of Canada, will continue to fly from the top of the Peace Tower only when Parliament is in Session. This is in accordance with long-standing tradition. However, authorities felt that the flag should be in evidence on Parliament Hill at other times as well.

I have recently been receiving resolutions from various municipalities urging that the \$40 Old Age Pension be increased to \$65 per month. At the present time there are Provincials in Canada which supplement the Old Age Pension up to \$20, based on a Means Test. There is no likelihood that the Federal Government is contemplating increasing the Old Age Pension from \$40 and it was good news indeed that the Ontario Government will be increasing the supplementary assistance to Ontario's needy Old Age pensioners from \$10 to \$20. This cost will be shared by the municipalities on a 60-40 basis.

The Federal-Provincial Conference which was held in Ottawa on Friday, March 9th, was the briefest, full-dress fiscal conference on record. The Federal Government at Ottawa is standing pat on its offer and is not willing to surrender the tax fields she acquired during the Second World War period which were in some instances previously enjoyed by the Provincials. A drastic revision would be necessary to allow a larger share of the tax dollars to the Provincials and particularly to the hard-pressed municipalities.

With the rising costs in maintenance, administration and education, the situation as far as the municipalities are concerned, is becoming desperate year by year. With only one source of tax revenue that the municipalities now have, on real estate property, it is becoming a question of how long the municipal taxpayer will be able to shoulder this burden.


