









ANTARCTIC BIRD LIFE


AT HEARD ISLAND, 3,500 miles southwest of Melbourne, scientist bird-watchers have tagged several thousand Antarctic birds in a plan to trace the wild life migration from Antarctica. This is the first time the bird life of the southern continent has been closely examined. At Macquarie island, the scientists also are looking into the habits of the royal penguins, which are found nowhere else in the Antarctica regions. Penguins build their nests from grass roots near the coastline. Petrel chicks from the island station have been reported at Argentina, 9,000 miles away.
