

Why Do Men Worship Idols?

"Why do men worship idols of wood and stone?" is one of the questions which will be answered by Rev. Wayne Brenneman during the missionary address at Stouffville United Missionary Church on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock. Rev. Brenneman has an unusual display of idols once worshipped by the Yoruba people with whom he and his wife worked for the past eight years.

During the Brenneman's past term of service in Nigeria, they have taught in both the Yoruba Bible School and Girl's School. While supervising the work of the United Missionary Church of Africa in the Share district, they have seen the number of baptized Christians more than double. Ten new churches and schools were built by the congregations of the district during that time.

Rev. Brenneman graduated from both Goshen High School and Goshen College before going to Nigeria in 1917. He has been active in the translation of literature and in writing articles for missionary publications. The message on Wednesday will be preceded by a series of beautiful and challenging Kodachrome slides illustrative of United Missionary Church in Nigeria. Don't miss this service.

Mr. and Mrs. Claude Watson were weekend guests with Mr. and Mrs. Gerry MacDougall of Westmount, Quebec.

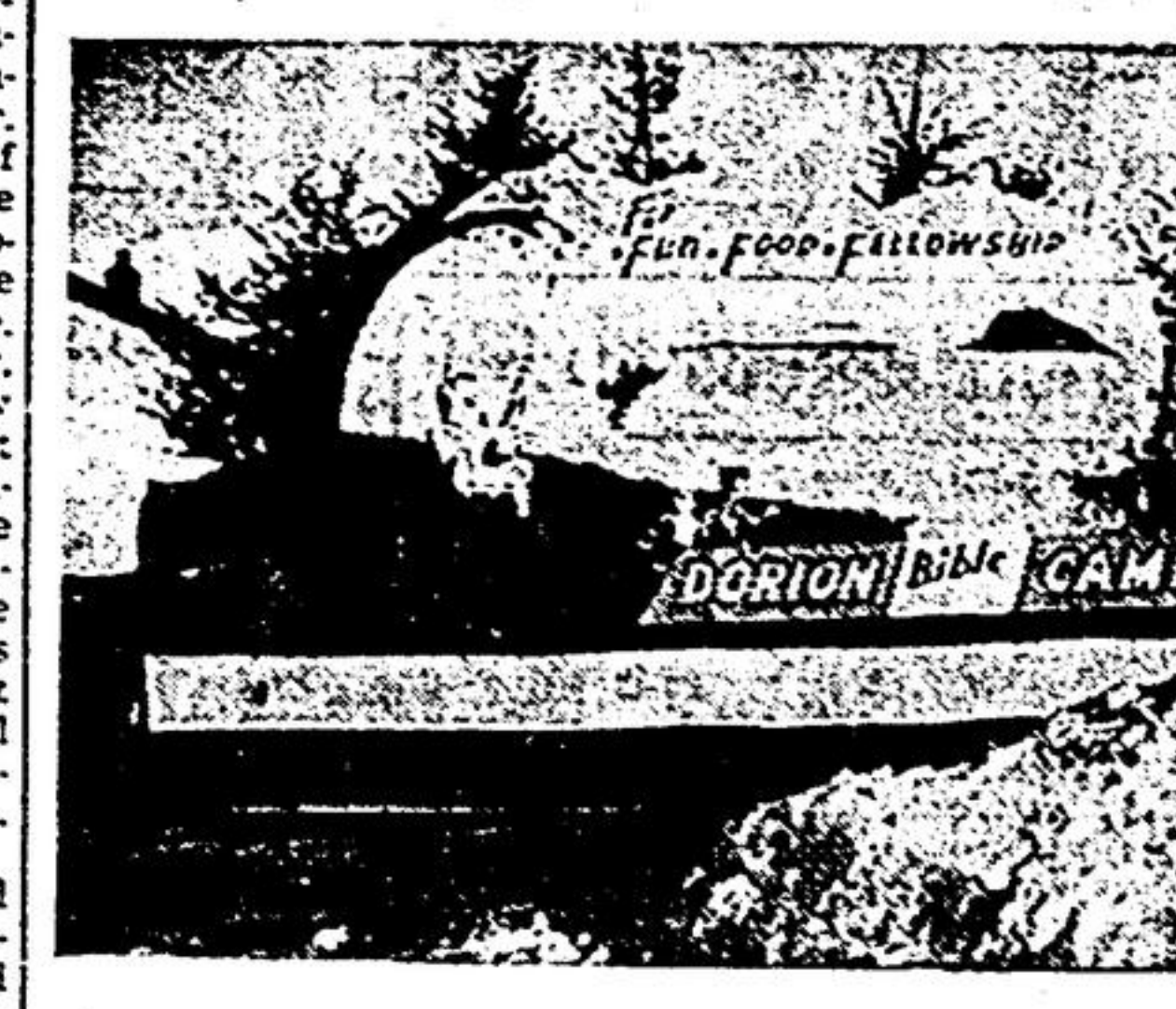
