

END OF THE LINE

The Stouffville Clippers passed out of the playoff hockey picture on Friday night at Georgetown. The one-sided 8-1 setback was a rather rude shock for the local fans who were confident that Stouffville would pull the series out of the fire and enter further Ontario playdowns. This was not the case however. There can be no arguments or excuses, the Clippers were well beaten and for the most part, the score really indicated the play. There must be a big question mark in the minds of the many hundreds of Stouffville supporters who witnessed the last two games of the series. On Tuesday night of last week, Stouffville whipped their rivals in a decisive manner 6-1 and then lost 8-1 in the seventh game. There must be some reason for such a reversal of form but it's unlikely that even the players themselves have a solution. Perhaps it was asking too much to expect any team to come back and win three straight games? Perhaps they had an off night? Perhaps fourteen games in six weeks was too much hockey and the players were tired out? Certainly they didn't play up to par. From watching two Clipper victories in the fifth and sixth games, one could hardly believe that the same team could be beaten by seven goals. Although Stouffville had a one goal lead going into the second period, it was quite evident that nothing more than a miracle would allow them to retain the slim advantage for the remainder of the contest. They lacked speed and drive and with the exception of one or two players, the entire team was off color. .

There's always two sides to every story. The loss at Georgetown on Friday night was the gloomy side but throughout the season there have been many cheerful highlights. The Intermediate "A" group has, this year, been one of the best leagues to perform here in many a season. The Clippers have provided local hockey fans plenty of thrills and excitement both during the regular schedule and in the playoffs and there will be plenty of room in the arena next November for a similar entry. There has been renewed interest in Intermediate hockey here this winter and attendance, especially at playoff games was definitely on the upswing. We are sure Intermediate "A" hockey is Stouffville's hockey.
