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Missionary Convention Here Well Attended

Sunday morning saw the beginning of a week of missionary service in the United Missionary Church, Stouffville. In the morning service Miss Norma Cuthbertson and Rev. and Mrs. Clark, who are representatives of "The Voice of the Andes", radio station HCJB, at Quito, Ecuador, were the speakers.

Rev. Clark, who has been in missionary work in South America for 30 years, and who is now Canadian director of "The Voice of the Andes," gave a thrilling account of the work accomplished by sending the Gospel of Christ over the air to many countries in their own languages. He read letters received from hearers in Australia and in Sweden.

Miss Cuthbertson told of the five missionaries in Ecuador who lost their lives in January while seeking to take the Gospel to an unrequited Indian tribe. She told of the bravery of the bereaved wives and families of these noble men. An appeal was made for young people to step into the ranks

and fill the gap left when these men laid down their lives so valiantly.

In the Sunday School hour, Mrs. Clark took her hearers on an imaginary plane trip to visit a church and Sunday School in Ecuador which was meeting at the very hour that she was speaking in Stouffville.

In the evening service Rev. G. H. King, Canadian secretary of The Mission to Lepers, described the condition of the ten million lepers in the world today. Medical science has accomplished much with the new sulphene drugs in checking the disease; and in the operations on crippled hands; yet 97% of this vast number has yet been unreached and unhelped. The Mission to Lepers seeks not only to bring medical aid to these outcast people, but to bring to them the message of love and salvation through Jesus Christ.
