Record Missionary Offering at Vivian

The Vivian Church reports a record missionary offering at the regular Sunday service of March 25. Despite the sudden snow storm that blew up in the later afternoon and evening, there was a good company present and the total offering was \$1,235.78, made up of cash \$379.78 and promises \$856.00. The offering goes to a new Home Mission project, in rapidly growing Scarborough under the leadership of Rev. W. S. Whitcombe, who is also pastor of the Vivian Church.

Last year one of the largest building operations in the whole of the Metropolitan area of Toronto, Mr. Robert McClintock, offered Mr. Whitcombe real estate to the value of \$15,000 on condition that he would build a church on it and establish a gospel lighthouse in the large new subdivision of Wishing Well Acres. In order to avail itself of this offer, it is necessary for the infant church to raise \$25,000 before the end of March. The Vivian contribution brings up the total building fund offering, in cash and promises, to almost \$21,000, with additional donations to come from other sources. The comment of the pastor and workers of the Wishing Well Acres Church was couched in scriptural phrase: "This is the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes." The Vivian offering is all the more remarkable in view of the fact that it is only little more than a month since the church raised \$600.00 in one offering to pay for a new furnace.

The annual pot-luck supper at the Vivian Church was a huge success this year, in fact there were actually two of them. The first one was a kind of preview, staged on the scheduled night, but with only a few able to attend due to exceedingly icy road conditions. Last week the basement of the church was filled with members and friends of the church for a time of neighbourly fellowship. There was no charge of any sort made for this good time, as this church does not believe in employing such means to raise funds. Mr. Lloyd Grose acted as master of ceremonies and called upon Mr. Norman Fockler for the grand surprise of the evening; the presentation to the pastor and his wife of a beautiful occasional table for their new home on the occasion of their fourteenth wedding anniversary.

The presence of two visiting preachers added to the enjoyment of the occasion and both spoke briefly. They were Rev. Wm. Rae of Stouffville and Rev. Alfred C. Whitcombe of Shenstone Church, Brantford, the pastor's brother. The latter also preached at the Sunday evening service to the profit and blessing of all.

Has Ministered in Nigeria Since 1924

Rev. Paul Ummel, who will be speaking this Friday, March 30th at 8 p.m. in the United Missionary Church, first went to Nigeria in 1924. His wife joined him four years later, and together they mastered the Dakarkeri language. Through the years the Ummels have translated parts of the New Testament and other books into both the Dakarkeri and the Hausa languages, and have been instrumental in establishing a strong church among this formerly warlike tribe of people.

Rev. Ummel is a native of Elkhart county, Indiana, and is a brother of the late Rev. Joseph Ummel who died while serving in Nigeria in 1943.
