Find Driver Blameless In Highway Fatality

A coroner's jury, at Pickering last week held the driver blameless in the highway death of 8-year-old Larry Bath. The inquest was held in the Community Hall, Pickering Village. Coroner Dr. W. W. Tomlinson presided. Crown Attorney Alex C. Hall QC, conducted the inquiry. The jury's verdict was: "Larry Bath, age eight years, met his death due to hemorrhage of the brain, and shock, resulting from impact with a car driven by John Gillies, of Toronto, on Highway 401, in the west-bound lane, at the western end of Duffins Creek Bridge, in the Township of Pickering, on the fourth day of April, 1956, at approximately 3:45 p.m." Driver of the car, John Gillies, said at the inquest, that he was westbound when the boy jumped in front of him as he swerved to avoid hitting him.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE CONVERSION OF SAUL
 Acts 9:1-31
 (Lesson for May 6)
Golden Text — Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain. — John 15:16
THE LESSON AS A WHOLE
 Approach to the Lesson
 In this week's lesson the scene shifts from Jerusalem to Damascus, a city of great antiquity. It was already an old city in the days of Abraham, and we remember that from there came Abraham's faithful steward, Eliezer (Gen. 15:2). Later in history Damascus became the capital of Syria, and for a time was in league with the northern kingdom of Israel against Assyria, and tried to force Judaea to be party to the alliance. On a visit to Damascus King Ahab of Judah saw an altar which so intrigued him that he had a replica of it made for his own use in the Temple of Jerusalem, which thing became a snare to the people. In the first century of the Christian Era, Damascus was still a flourishing city with a strong Jewish populace, as was apparent from the fact that there were several synagogues there. On more than one occasion Jews had fled to Damascus from Judaea, and it would appear that the same thing had happened when Saul of Tarsus was leading the bitter persecution against the church in Jerusalem, which of course, was a Jewish church. Determined to follow his prey to their place of refuge, Saul himself was taken captive by the One whose followers he was persecuting, and ever after delighted to call himself the bondsman of Jesus Christ.
 Verse by Verse
 Acts 9:1—"And Saul, yet breathing out... slaughter... went unto the high priest." This action was in pursuance of his determination to root out the Christian "heresy." The Greek translated "breathing out" really means "breathing in." Persecution was as the breath of life to the raging heart of Saul.
 Verse 2—"... letters to Damascus... that if he found any of this way... bring them bound unto Jerusalem." Saul's objective probably was to apprehend those who had escaped from his clutches in Jerusalem and fled to Damascus. According to treaty rights with the Romans, the high priest could demand extradition of criminals who had fled from Jerusalem.
 Verse 3—"... and suddenly there shined round about him a light from heaven." The light that suddenly beat upon him was "above the brightness of the sun." To attribute it to the dazzling reflection of the sun from the white buildings of Damascus is to offer an insignificant cause for tremendous effects in Saul's after life.
 Verse 4—"And he... heard a voice... Saul, why persecutest thou me?" Saul is picked out from the whole company, and personally addressed. The double address ("Saul, Saul") is not unusual in the speech of Jesus (Luke, 10:41; 22:31).
 Verse 5—"Who art thou, Lord?... I am Jesus... the pricks." Notice how Jesus identifies Himself with His persecuted saints. We owe the presence of the reference to the pricks (goats) here to Erasmus, who inserted it in his Greek text from the Latin Vulgate. The phrase is authentic, however, in 26:14. The goats were sharpened sticks used to scrape the earth off the plowshare, and also to prod on a slow or balking ox.
 Verse 6—"Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" The surrender of the will was immediate, but three days were to elapse before further instruction was given.
 Verse 10—"... a certain disciple... Ananias... Ananias has no other title than "a disciple." But he was "on Call" to his Lord.
 Verse 11—"... The street which is called Straight... the house of Judas... Saul, of Tarsus... he prayeth." Straight Street is still there, a main thoroughfare, too. The house of Judas is (traditionally) near the west end of the street. Now we know what occupied Saul these three days — he was praying!
 Verse 12—"And hath seen in a vision... Ananias putting his hand on him, that he might receive his sight." Saul was thus prepared for the coming of Ananias, as Ananias had to be prepared for going to Saul! Compare with Cornelius and Peter (Acts 10).
 Verse 13—"I have heard... how much evil he hath done to thy saints..." Saul's reputation had gone abroad, and it was not such as to give comfort to the followers of Jesus.
 Verse 14—"He hath authority to bind all that call on thy name." It was known to the Christians that Saul had come armed with authority from the high priest. Perhaps someone with the Christians, had sent them warning.
 Verse 15—"He is a chosen vessel to bear my name before the Gentiles... kings... Israel." The Lord overruled the objections of Ananias. The persecutor is "a chosen vessel," and Ananias is given an indication of the extent of the ministry which awaits the new convert.

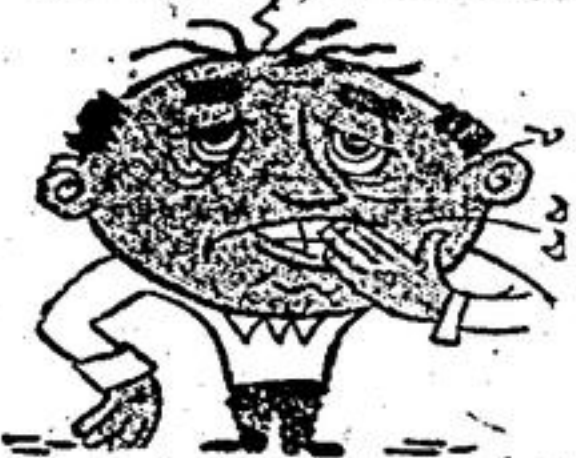
Verse 16—"... great things he must suffer for my name's sake." He who had inflicted much suffering must himself tread the path of suffering for the Lord's sake.
 Verse 17—"Brother Saul, the Lord hath sent me, that thou mightest receive thy sight, and be filled with the Holy Ghost." He who was so lately a bitter foe is now "brother." Ananias had a twofold ministry for Saul, physical and spiritual.
 Verse 18—"And immediately... he received sight and arose, and was baptized." With sight restored, Saul takes the step which identified him with the One whom he had so hated.
 Verse 19—"And when he had received meat, he was strengthened." A very practical touch. Compare Luke 8:55.
The Heart of the Lesson
 They tell us that once a tiger has tasted human blood, it has an insatiable appetite for it, and becomes a man-eater. Saul of Tarsus figuratively speaking, tasted Christian blood at the martyrdom of Stephen, and became a man-eating tiger in his insatiable persecution against the Church.
 But there is another explanation of his passionate zeal. He was not without qualms and doubts. His complacency in his Pharisaic position had doubtless been shaken by the unanswerable arguments of Stephen in the Synagogue of the Libertines, and the impressions made on him by the dying triumph of the martyr could not be easily erased. He was not so sure of himself. But when these doubts and questionings would grip him, his Jewish pride and his Pharisaic prejudices would be as goads, so he would seek to drown his uncertainty in more ardent persecution of the saints.
 All the time the great Head of the Church had His eye and His hand upon this seeming arch-enemy, so that when he was at the peak of his campaign of extermination, the Lord suddenly broke in upon him. Clothed with light above the brightness of the sun. He blinded Saul on the outskirts of Damascus. But, although his physical eyes were blinded by the flash of heavenly light, yet Saul saw within that light the One whom he knew to be the Lord. In answer to his question, the Lord identified Himself as Jesus.
 Had one said to Saul of Tarsus one moment before that light from heaven burst upon him, "Jesus of Nazareth is the Lord," he doubtless would have rent his robe in horror of such blas-

O.P.P. Continuing Campaign Against Traffic Violators

The Ontario Provincial Police are continuing their campaign against traffic violators, and Vandoni detachment headquarters have reported to this newspaper, the figures covering accidents on the highways in March.
 There were a total of 2,028 accidents, 36 of them fatal. The number of persons killed was 42 with 654 injured. Warnings were issued to 29,591 drivers and 11,322 charges were laid. The number of vehicles checked in the month totalled 89,245. Figures for the local detachment showed a decrease last month.

phemy. Now it is different. To This One whose very glory told him that He was the Lord, and who introduced Himself as Jesus, Saul yielded in a complete surrender of his will—"Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" From that moment the very heart of his theology was Jesus is Lord! Indeed, this is the heart of the Christian confession. Let us not forget that to Saul of Tarsus, the Lord meant "Jehovah, the God of Abraham, and of Isaac, and of Jacob."
 The rest of the story flows naturally from this surrender and confession. The three days of fasting, the ministry of Ananias, the recovery of sight, the baptism, and the fullness of the Holy Spirit were the first items in his preparation for that ministry and suffering, of which the Lord spoke so clearly to Ananias.
 Never again does this Ananias appear in the sacred record. Apart from this one incident, he is one of God's unknowns. Nevertheless, he is one of the celebrities of the church through that gracious and effective ministry that he performed on behalf of one who became the greatest of the apostles.

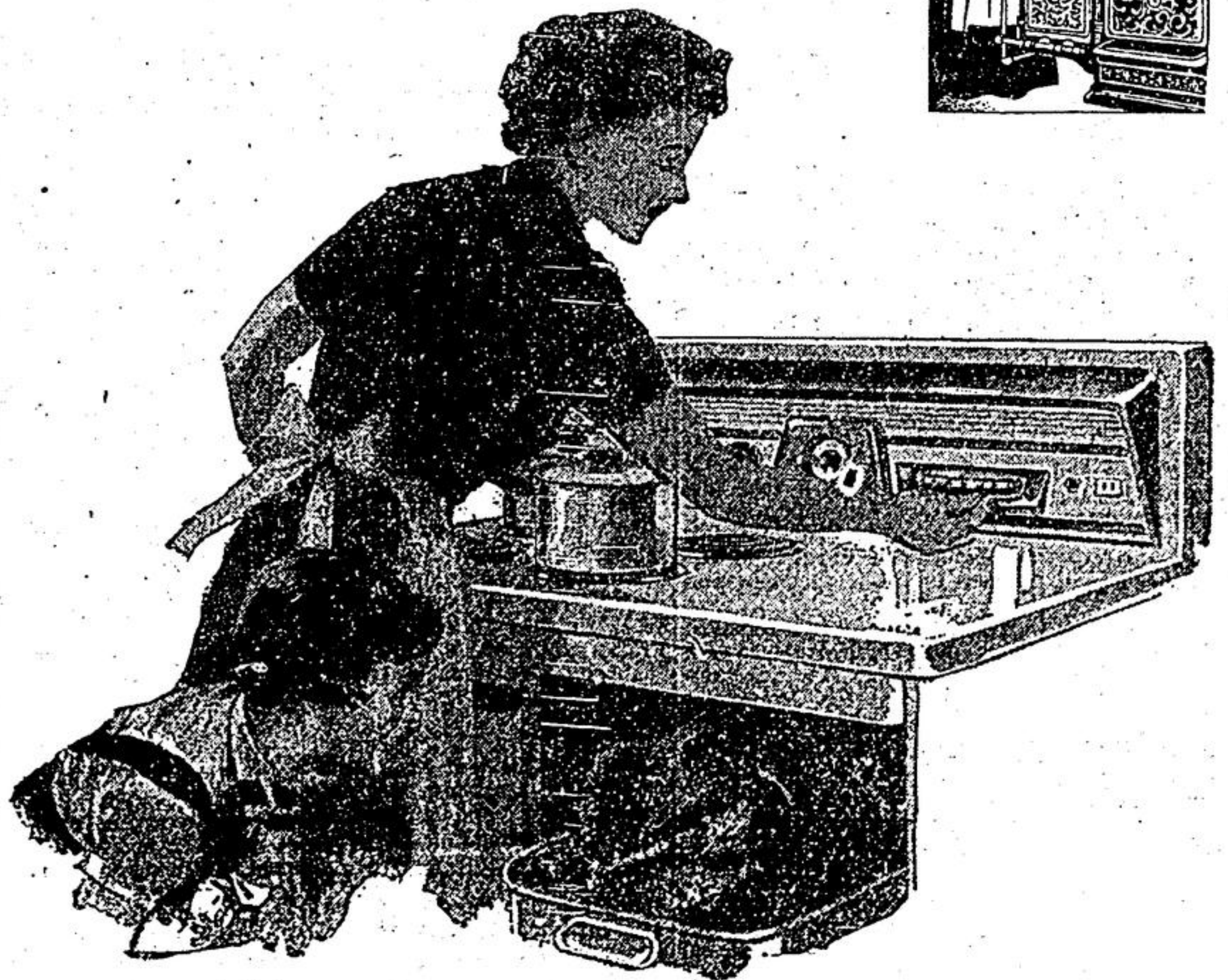
