TRIBUNE BEGINS 67TH YEAR

The Stouffville Tribune enters its 67th year of operation with the current issue. During more than two thirds of this period the newspaper has been operated by two families familiar to Stouffville, the Malloy family and Nolan family, the latter being owners for the past thirty-six years.

The newspaper business in Stouffville has had a long and colorful career in town, going back to 1837. At that time history records that John Boyer purchased the Wm. Lyon Mackenzie wooden press and set it up in Stouffville, and for some time it was the only press in this part of the country north of Toronto. For ten years it was operated by the Wheeler family who later took it to Uxbridge.

Early newspapers here were called the Stouffville Alert and the Stouffville Advance, later the Free Press operated by the Covington Bros.

Weather and Fertilizer

We recommend an application of 200-300 pounds per acre of 4-24-12 or 300-400 pounds of 3-18-9. We feel, that because of the unsatisfactory weather conditions, farmers should be encouraged to use, the higher rates recommended by the Fertilizer-Advisory Board.

Where hay and pastures have not been top-dressed 250-300 pounds per acre Triple Ten (10-10-10) or 6-12-12 should be applied.

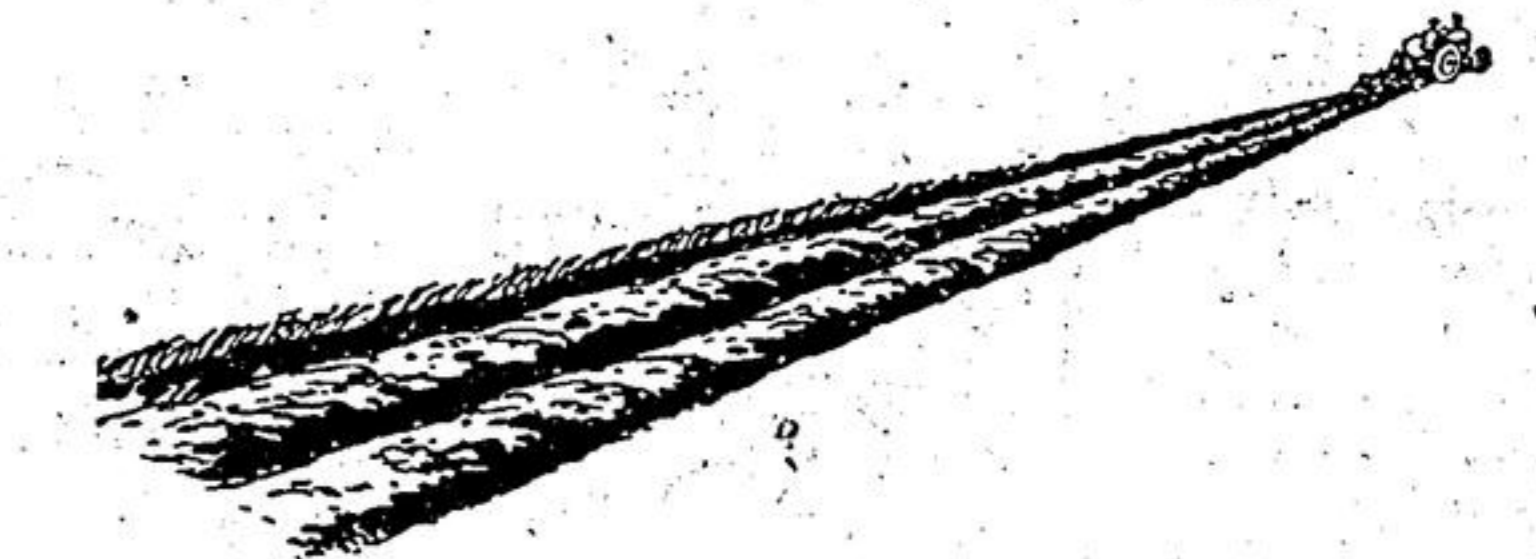
