Weather and Fertilizer

We recommend an application of 200-300 pounds per acre of 4-24-12 or 300 -400 pounds of 3-18-9. We feel, that because of the unsatisfactory weather conditions, farmers should be encouraged to use the higher rates recommended by the Fertilizer-Advisory Board.

Where hay and pastures have not been topdressed 250-300 pounds per acre Triple Ten (10-10-10) or 6-12-12 should be applied.


